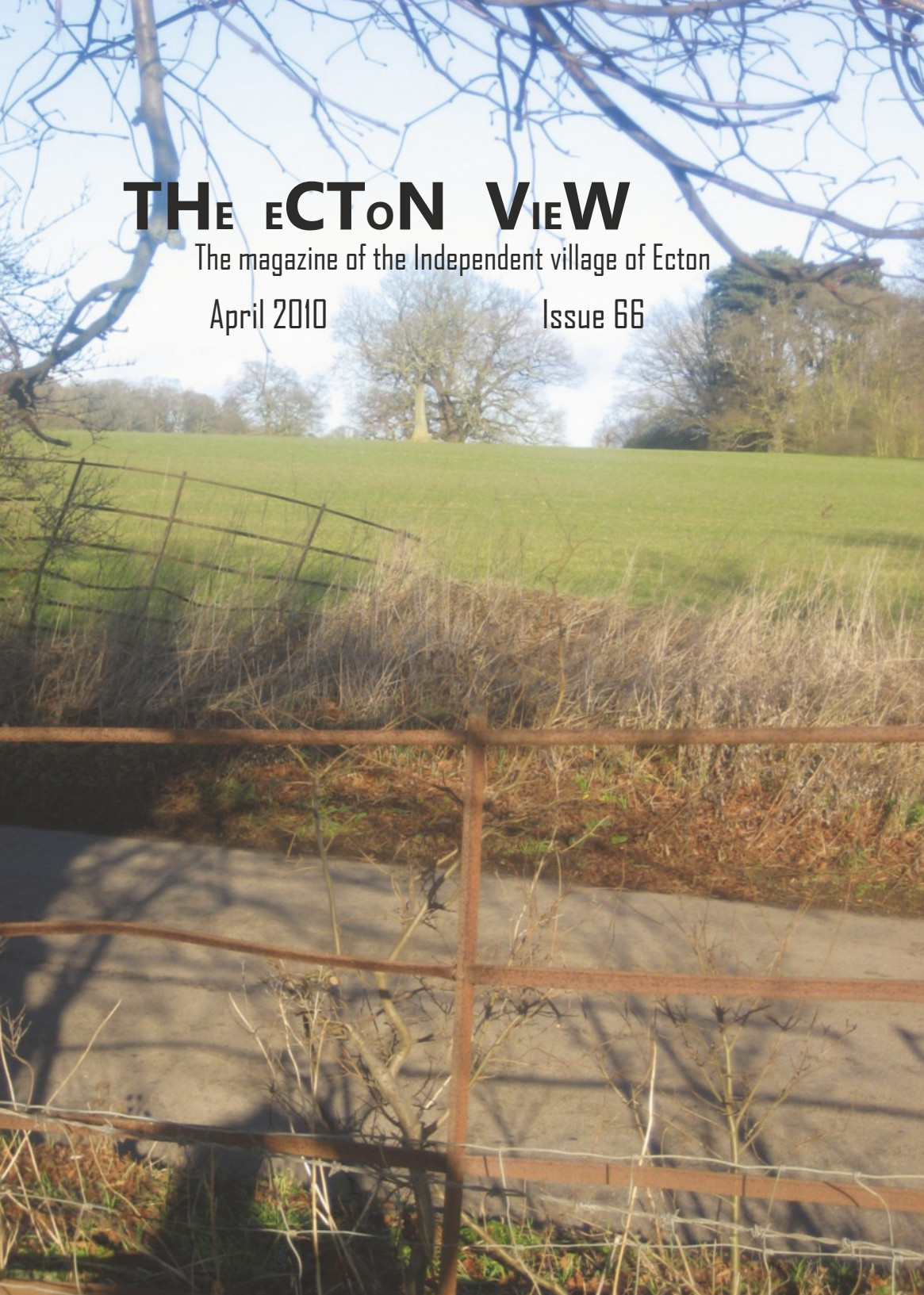

## From the Vicarage,

Happy Easter! This year Easter falls at the very beginning of April (Maundy Thursday is April 1<sup>st</sup>) and this year we have tried a number of new ideas for our various events. These are all listed in our regular events list and also all residents should have received our regular Easter leaflet through your door. So what are these new ideas?

- Just at the end of March, on Tuesday 30<sup>th</sup> we have an interactive display in Church (open from 8.00pm) to help us reflect upon the events of this week and our journey through it. During the day the children from Ecton School will have used this at their own level so then it's the grown-ups' turn.
- On Good Friday – a March of Witness in Earls Barton since we joined a United Churches group there during last autumn.
- On Good Friday – activities for teenagers in Great Doddington Memorial Hall.
- On Good Friday – a 'Tenebrae' service at Ecton, a very atmospheric adult service during which a series of candles is gradually extinguished as the story of Jesus' trial and death is read and the end draws ever closer.
- On Good Friday evening – an event for the whole Wellingborough area in which massed choirs present the devotional work 'The Crucifixion by Sir John Stainer in All Saints Church, Midland Road.
- On Easter Eve – a Service of Light with Confirmation for the whole Wellingborough area, also in All Saints Church, Midland Road. Bishop Frank will lead this service.

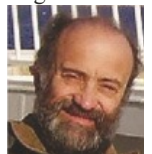
Everyone is most welcome at all of these events as well as the other regular ones so please do come and share them with us.

I feel I should say something this month about **Dr. David Morgan**. David was not a resident of the village, but he had served us faithfully for many years as a most accomplished organist about twice a month. David sadly died earlier this month. He was a very private person, who was not easy to get to know, but he was extremely faithful and reliable and we shall miss him greatly. At the time of his death he was planning an organ recital in Ecton Church later in the year and had just generously funded a much-needed modification to the organ. As I write details of his funeral are not yet available.

Now is very much a time to look forward. Everyone seems to agree that it has been a very long winter this year and at last, as the temperature begins to rise and the light evenings grow longer folk are feeling more positive and ready to plan for the future. At St. Mary Magdalene's we approach our Annual Parochial Church Meeting (April 18<sup>th</sup>) when we review the past year and plan for the future. Much of that planning is already in place this year following the analysis of our 'vision day', held last November, but a big issue for us is having sufficient members prepared to serve on our Church council. We have managed the last year with a number of vacancies, but that has caused some difficulties and we hope very much that more members will offer to serve in the coming year. We are also looking for a new churchwarden. **Walter Barty** has served for many years, but the time has come now for a very well-earned retirement. He goes with our love and most grateful thanks, but knowing Walter, we shall no doubt see him around, quietly serving faithfully in a host of other ways.

This spring and summer seem set to be busy and exciting times for us, with various events planned and more in the pipeline, and we look forward with eager anticipation. I look forward to reporting further in future editions of 'Ecton View'.

# Has Bernie shot his bolt?

The most exciting F1 season ever! Four World Champions, the return of Michael Schumacher, a new points system rewarding winners and placed-men to tenth, new teams forming a 24 car grid, new technical rules to encourage overtaking; what a prospect in store as millions of us sat down in front of the TV for Bernie's 60<sup>th</sup> Anniversary show from Bahrain.

Oh dear. Once the brief excitement of the start was over we were treated to a procession of cars going round an empty circuit with a hot and dusty desert backdrop. Suddenly we remembered of what it means to watch a full Formula One race without refuelling stops – boredom. Pit stops for fuel were introduced to liven up the show and whilst it meant there were effectively two or three 'sprint races' at least this was racing.

In Bahrain, once the drivers were settled in position, with Alonso's great early move on Massa in the bag, Vettel led the cars around this cartoon circuit with no sign of any changes in track position in prospect. "Unless Vettel's car breaks that's it" I said to myself as my mind started to wander by about lap eight. OK, it did break a bit, and this loss of pace allowed the two Ferrari drivers and Lewis through, but don't bank on this kind of reliability problem occurring regularly amongst the front-runners, because it won't.

From being the most eagerly-anticipated season ever, F1 managed within about an hour, to shoot itself in the foot on many levels. Whilst it is great to see new teams in F1 should the zenith of motor-sport really have cars that have never run before being assembled at the circuit and sent out with rookie drivers on a track with the fastest cars and the best drivers in the world? It reminded me of the 1970's, and I don't mean that in a good way.

Bernie has the gall to criticise Silverstone for reminding him of "what F1 used be like in the old days" but I think 2010 could be the most retrograde step for the sport for a decade if Bahrain is anything to go by. Three cheers for Lotus, but already Jean Todt of the FIA has mooted the reintroduction of the 107% qualifying rule. Good luck to Virgin racing and HRT if this happens. By the way do the Spanish owners know what HRT stands for in English? Shouldn't someone tell them?

I hope I'm wrong but I think we may be in for a long season of tedious races and that is so disappointing. I speak as someone who has watched almost every F1 race for more than three decades so I don't relish this prospect one iota. Do you think they might bring back refuelling stops? You can be sure they will in 2011, but what a shame they ever thought it was a good idea to get rid of them.

I think Martin Brundle summed it up best about 2/3rds through when Jonathan Legard asked him what he thought of the first race of the season. "I wish you hadn't asked me that" he replied and in seven little words expressed the feelings of F1 fans throughout the country. The Spanish will be delighted to see Alonso win his first race with Ferrari whilst the Italian 'Tifosi' will deify him. The rest of us will worry that instead of a new "Schumacher Era" we had maybe hoped for we are witnessing the start of another period of Ferrari domination with Alonso in the driving seat this time.

Fingers crossed that Bahrain was a one-off and that we get an exciting race in Australia. I'll be watching at the start but I might be down the pub before the end!

## **Cobblers 0 – 3 Aldershot**

Northampton town fell to a three nil defeat at Sixfields stadium to Aldershot after an ill-tempered affair. Northampton in the first 10 minutes or so looked all right on the ball. However in the 11th minute Kevin Thornton stamped on Anthony Straker. The referee had no hesitation in sending him off and to ruin the game. It would have been more appropriate to book him and warn him because from then on tempers were running high. Straight after the foul Scott Donnelly crossed from the free kick and Marvin Morgan headed home and deliberately celebrated in front of the home fans. A few minutes later after a challenge and an elbow in the face by Anthony Straker on John Johnson he reacted angrily and pushed the him away. Next up Ryan Gilligan came over and pushed Straker away as well and that when the melee started. At the end of it the referee picked out Adebayo Akinfenwa, Anthony Straker and Scott Donnelly as the worst offenders and booked all of them. Really though he could have sent off all fifteen player involved, some subs and Aldershot manager Kevin Dillon. Ben Herd and Anthony Charles were the next two players to get booked, Herd for an elbow in the face and Charles for a late challenge on Luke Guttridge. Thing calmed down slightly in the second half however there was a lot of hard and reckless tackles flying in. Ryan Gilligan was next in the referees notebook (earning his 9th yellow card of the season) after a late challenge on Anthony Straker. Next up John Johnson was lucky to escape any card at all after a two footed tackle on another Aldershot player to become a victim of some of the Cobblers players' poor tackling. Aldershot doubled the lead when Kirk Hudson went on a long run from his own half to blast the ball past goal keeper Chris Dunn. After an awful back pass from Dean Beckwith to helpless goalkeeper Chris Dunn who couldn't do anything to stop Marvin Morgan adding his second goal of the game and Aldershot's third of the night in the 78th minute. This brought the end to The Cobblers 11 match un-beaten run with a bang.

## At the Allotment

### Having an Allotment – Is it worth it?

I'm not quite sure why we have an allotment. When we moved to Ecton some four years ago, in estate agents speak, the garden would be described as being manageable, which was exactly what we wanted. Instead spending all Sunday and summer evenings mowing the lawn etc, we could do more something more interesting.

Somehow we managed to get half an allotment, approx. 90' long by 30' wide, that had not been worked for two seasons, so mother nature had taken over with wild flowers (weeds) couch grass, as well as others things you can't eat. I thought, 'What the heck are we doing with this piece of England'?

Anyway we set to and after three seasons, and numerous visits to the chiropractor, it seems we have just about got on top of it.

Then there are the natural enemies of the allotmentere, such as birds, mice, slugs and snails, which all help themselves to the produce we try to grow. Oh yes, of course there are the vagaries of the weather. Finally, at last there is fruition of picking our own vegetables even though they come all at once and excess is given away.

Another reason we like our allotment is the social side. Between attending to the allotments there is always discussion and helpful advice on what to do. We are also surprised at the interest our friends take and some of them have recently taken on allotments in Ecton and elsewhere.

Needless to say when I first mentioned our allotment to friends, they came up with the nickname for me, Digga!!

Oh yes. Guess what our time is taken up on quite a few Sundays, and some summer evenings?

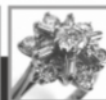
