What an impressive website. Can't tell you how impressed I am. I am very interested in soldiers who served in WW1 and have been doing a little work on Bertie Timms. He worked in the dining cars of the railways. From what I could make out of the album it says he served in the Northampton Regiment but all the details available list his service with 23 Battalion Middlesex Regiment with a date of death as September 1916. Is this in conflict with the details you have. I also wondered if I might be able to arrange to see the album, it's a wonderful thing.

Private Bertie Timms 23rd Bn. Middlesex Regiment died age 23 on 26th September 1916 son of William and Frances Harriet Timms of Rectory Farm, Ecton. Buried St. Sever Cemetery, Rouen. Although born in Northampton he was described as a native of Luddington, Oundle. He enlisted at Mill Hill, Middlesex and was living at Harlesden. He joined the 23rd Battalion of the Duke of Cambridges' Own (Middlesex Regiment) a service battalion raised in June 1915 and bearing the title 2nd Football. It was part of the 123rd brigade, 41st Division and landed in France in May 1916. Bertie died of wounds at Rouen. Rouen was a major hospital centre which received many of those wounded during the Battle of the Somme of which Flers-Courcelette was a subsidiary battle. Where the Battalion positioned before pulling out in the evening of September 26th having suffered nearly 200 casualties. The information in the WW1 Book in Ecton church was often added after an event and was not always accurate as it depended on information given by relatives sometimes well after a person had joined up or had died. In Bertie's case it is quite feasible that the compiler assumed that as his parents were in Ecton he had joined the Northants regiment.

Hope this helps with your research.

Hello Guy. I see that you are interested in finding out more about Bertie Timms and others from Ecton who served and died in the Great War. I know that Angela Crabtree has already sent you a lot of details from her very considerable research and all that I can add is that Bertie's father William (also Bert) became the farm manager of Rectory Farm in the village in about 1915. At that time this Church land was farmed by the Northampton Corporation who were responsible for the main sewage farm which was next door to the land. Bert continued to farm and live in Rectory Farm until his death there in 1930 when my father, aged 21, then took over the tenancy and stayed there for another 49 years, during which time I, along with my 2 brothers, were all born there. You said that you were also interested in seeing the actual War Album which you have viewed thro' the website. This is kept in the Church as it was originally compiled by the Rector at the time so if you would let me know when you might like to see it I can arrange to get the key, unless you happen to want to come along on a Sunday when there is a service. ## NEW RECYCLING CENTRE CONTRACT AIMS TO TACKLE ENVIRONMENTAL CHALLENGES

A new contract governing the running of the county's household waste recycling centres will ensure the service develops over the next 15 years to tackle environmental challenges ahead.

Northamptonshire County Council has selected Enterprise Managed Services (EMS) as its preferred bidder for the household waste recycling centre (HWRC) management contract.

The management of waste is becoming increasingly expensive with high, unavoidable future costs being faced by the county council as a result of recent changes in legislation. Cllr Heather Smith, county council cabinet member for environment, growth and transport, said:

“Carrying on putting the same amount of waste in landfill really isn't an option for us as not only is this disastrous environmentally, but because of new legislation, is becoming increasingly expensive.

“We're confident that this new contract, which will be over 15 years, is the best one to take us forward to meet the challenges that lie ahead and bring about more recycling in Northamptonshire.

“We will see a great many changes over the next 15 years and there will be a number of improvements to our recycling centres, which will bring benefits to everyone.”

The new contract will start on April 1, 2010 and from then onwards there will be a series of changes to the 10 recycling centres across Northamptonshire.

These include:

- Revised and enhanced site layout changes within the first year of the contract to encourage recycling and reuse.
- Re-development of the sites to address population increase over the course of the 15 year contract. This will include general infrastructure changes at sites and the upgrading of four single level sites to split level along with the addition of multi-lane off-loading at: – Towcester, Wellingborough, Ecton and Corby.
- Enhanced and expanded small-scale commercial waste services at four sites – Ecton, Sixfields, Kettering and Rushden HWRCs (currently just Ecton).
- A 'meet and greet' service at the centres so that people can be assisted in locating where the correct bins are.
- The creation of off-site shops for reuse items, which can be bought, freeing-up room at the sites to provide more recycling services.
- Wollaston HWRC will become a waste-free recycling centre. No non-recyclable (ie black bag) waste will be accepted on the site.
- To provide a more cost effective service EMS propose the following changes in times when the sites are open to the public:
  - o longer opening hours in summer (April-Sept) 8am to 8pm (12 hours) and longer winter times (Oct-Mar) 8am-6pm (10 hours)
  - o Five sites would be open seven days a week - Kettering, Rushden, Sixfields, Ecton and Daventry.
  - o Five sites would be operated five days a week (to include weekends and all peak periods) – Brixworth, Corby, Towcester, Wellingborough and Wollaston.

From the Vicarage,



Since The Ecton View had a break in January it's a long time since I last wrote and this is my first opportunity to wish all our readers a Happy New Year. And what a New Year it has been so far! We had quite a bit of snow before Christmas and it has hardly let up since. Even among those who normally love the snow I am now hearing people say they are glad it has at last gone, although more is forecast. For some, of course, the conditions make life very difficult, especially among the elderly, and at this time of year we usually expect a significant increase in the number of funerals we conduct. This year, within the first two weeks no fewer than four had been booked across our three villages, one of which was in Ecton. Life in our village schools has been disrupted as well, with closure for 'snow days' on several occasions.

In November last year our three churches held a day that we spent together one Saturday to consider our vision for the future and where we are going. That has now resulted in the production of a leaflet for each, outlining our vision for the next five years, together with an action plan for the first – for 2010. This is being distributed to all Church members.

One issue for us is that we have a wonderful resource in our lovely building, but it is in some ways inflexible for use for a variety of activities and part of our vision is to put that right. We are certainly not out to compete with the village hall, which is another terrific facility in the village, but we have no doubt that there are some activities for which the Church building would be perfect with a little imaginative thought and reorganisation. When our medieval churches were first built they would have been the only community space in the village and used for everything from Church services to the local village market – complete with livestock! I don't think I'm suggesting that we go that far, but I am suggesting that this is not a modern idea – rather a return to what happened back in the 'good old days'!

Another part of our vision for the future is to do whatever we can to draw the Church and village communities closer together. We want to be rather more part of village life than perhaps we are perceived to be at the moment and we are hoping to be able to forge real and happy links with many of the village groups and activities.

Over the past year we have worked hard to re-introduce work with children at Ecton Church. Two new initiatives have begun and are going well. Firstly, we began a monthly after-school club in the village school using some material called 'Story Keepers' and we regularly have over 25% of the children coming along. Secondly, we have begun a regular monthly All-age Sunday service, which is also growing. Both these new activities are planned and run by a dedicated team of people with real vision and drive and we are very grateful to them. The third prong of our vision for the future is to continue to develop this work

When I wrote for the December issue I referred back to the Millennium celebrations ten years ago and reflected upon what we think may or may not have been achieved since then. From what I have written here I hope it is clear that Ecton Church is entering the second decade in a very buoyant spirit. We look forward to the future with excitement as we gradually implement the various projects and initiatives that arose from that special 'Vision Day' last November.

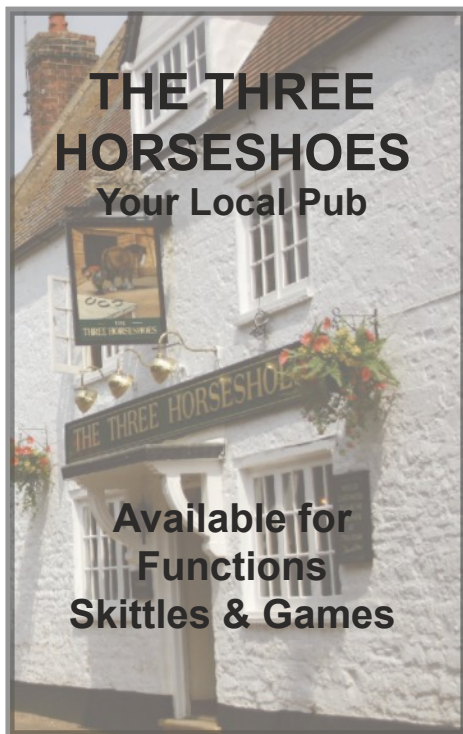

# Langdell, The Blacksmiths of Ecton.

When John Cole wrote his book a History of Ecton he wrote it in the Ecton home of his Aunt Anne, he went into great detail concerning all the prominent people of Ecton, and perhaps understandably, makes no mention of his Aunt, who, by marriage, was a Langdell. At that time the Langdell's would have been just ordinary hard working folk, but in truth they were just as much a part of Ecton history as anyone else, and in many respects even more so.

By the time that John Cole was writing his book, his Aunt Anne Langdell was already a Widow, her husband William, who had been an Ecton Malster, and a well respected member of the Yeomanry, had died young, aged just 27. He was buried in the Ecton Churchyard with full military honours on the 17<sup>th</sup> of November in 1803.

However, just across the yard from Aunt Langdell's house, and living at number 2 Horseshoe Yard was George Langdell, the surviving brother of William, a man who was carrying on 200 years of family work in the trade of Ecton Blacksmith.

The story appears to begin with a Jonathon Langdale who was born in the nearby village of Hardwick in 1640, the son of Thomas Langdale and his wife Elizabeth. Nothing is known of Jonathon's early life but it would seem most likely that it was he who took up the trade of a Blacksmith in Ecton, in the 1660's. The waters muddy more than a little with the Ecton parish register for 1669 showing a Jonathon Langley of Ecton Marrying an Elizabeth Lilly of Pytchley on the 29<sup>th</sup> of January, this entry although seemingly correct, appears perhaps to be an error of the reverend John Palmer, brought about perhaps by the reverends familiarity with the Langley name, as he had baptised the children of a Langley family who had slightly earlier lived in the village.

The error appears to have been further compounded with the first child of Jonathon and Elizabeth, a daughter who was baptised Elizabeth and whose surname appears to have been entered into the register incorrectly but then corrected at some later date to Langdale. The proof of this is shown in Jonathon and Elizabeth Langdale, as they were now shown in all subsequent baptism register entries for their six children, four daughters and two sons.

One of those sons, who was named William, died in infancy and it was Thomas, born in 1674 who took up his father's trade and continued as a Blacksmith in Ecton.

On the 12<sup>th</sup> of March 1696 in Draughton, Thomas Langdale of Ecton married Sarah Dawkes, also of Ecton, and once again confusion seems to have set in, for according to the baptisms register, each of their five children were baptised with the surname of Langly.

How this situation came about might seem unanswerable, there had been a Langley family in Ecton back in 1640's and there would be new Langley's again in the future but at the time of the baptism of Thomas's children there appear to have been no one else with the Langley name in Ecton that might give rise to any confusion, perhaps it was a clerical error, incredibly multiplied by five, or perhaps it was a deliberate attempt at a name change by Thomas, however, when Thomas died in 1744 he was buried as Thomas Langdell, and recorded as such in the burial register, just a slight phonetic variation on the name Langdale.

The solution to this puzzle may simply be that the name Langley, Langdale and Langdell all had the same habitational meaning and were acceptably interchangeable, derived from the old English word *Lang* (meaning long) and *Léah* (meaning wood or glade). Our original Thomas or his ancestors may well have come from some wooded valley and simply had been known by that place.

Of Thomas and Sarah Langdale's five children two were boys, and it was their second son William who carried on the family trade of Blacksmith, what became his other son, who had been named Jonathon, is unknown. A clue to the time of the Langdale / Langdell name change can be found in the marriage of William, son of Thomas, when William, who was born in 1700, married Sarah Childs, also of Ecton, in the April of 1730, his surname was recorded in the marriage register as Langdell, the same as was later entered in the burial register for his father, this name then endured, as each of his six children were baptised with that same surname. Just like his father before him, William named his own two sons Jonathon and William. It is not known if both took to the anvil, but unfortunately William died a young man, single and aged just 25 in 1769.

However, Jonathon Langdell certainly did take to the forge, and in 1755 at the age of 22, married Mary Lambert, an Ecton born girl, and together they had at least three daughters before she died in 1767. Although there is no record of a baptism it looks like Jonathon and Mary may also have had a son, named Jonathon born in 1763 because there is a recorded burial of a Jonathon Langdell aged 20 in 1783. Although left with three young daughters and possibly a son, Jonathon did not marry again until 1774, when he married an Ann Hart. This marriage produced another six children, four boys and two girls, the boys being William, born in 1776, Thomas born in 1781, George born in 1783 and Jonathon born in 1787.

In 1798 William Langdell married Ann Cole of Weston Favell, who thus became Ann Langdell, Aunt to the author John Cole.

Thomas Langdell married Mary Garley of Pytchley in 1802 and they lived out their lives in the town of Wellingborough.

George Langdell married Mary Hodges of Rothersthorpe in 1810 and stayed on in Ecton working as a Blacksmith.

Jonathon Langdell married an Elizabeth, date unknown, and had also stayed on in Ecton with his brother George, working as a Blacksmith.

George and Mary Langdell had, what might almost seem by previous baptisms, to be the three obligatory sons named William, Thomas and Jonathon, as well as two daughters, before Mary died in 1819. George then married Elizabeth Gobey of Ecton in 1823 but no further children were born, and of George's three sons, it was Thomas who now kept with tradition and became the village Blacksmith.

Thomas, who was born in 1813, married Mary Warren of Earls Barton in 1844 and they had eleven children, nine were girls and two were boys, but here was the end of the story, one of the sons, Joseph, died in infancy, and the surviving son who was named George, moved into the shoe making trade, for reasons unknown to us, the life of burns, blisters and back ache were not for him.

Thomas had been the village Smithy for all his working life and died in 1890 aged 77, and with him, over 225 years of family blacksmithing within the village came to an end. During that time, whether by accident, design, or divine intervention, the name of this branch of the family became forever Langdell, and while it was not the end of a Blacksmith in Ecton, and certainly not the end of Langdell name, it was the end of an Ecton Blacksmith, whose name, for centuries, had been Langdell

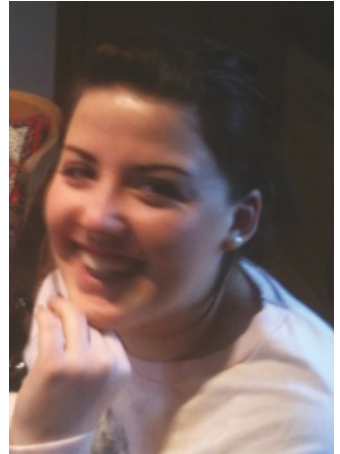
