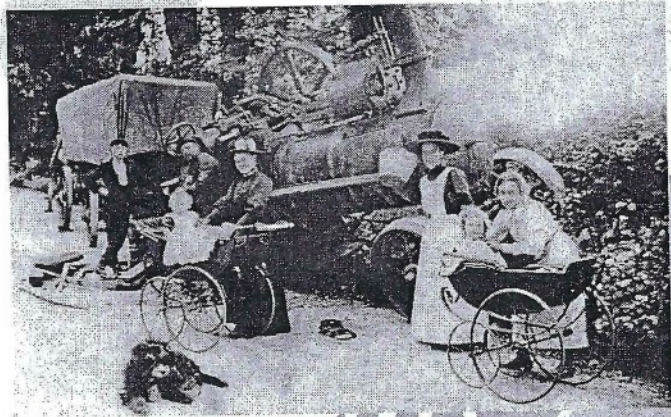

Ecton Church Development

As many will have noticed, we have now completed the last stage of the facilities development brought about by the closure of Ecton House as a conference centre in the year 2000.

In March magazine of that year there was a copy of the first plan of Architects, Gotch Pearson drawn up in October 1999 for:-

- a) Replacement of toilet facilities.
- b) Replacement of refreshment facilities.
- c) Replacement of dedicated meeting room.

These plans were revamped several times to meet either planning regulations or design constraints.

In that same magazine it notes that Will Wilson had been appointed sole fundraiser with a brief to seek funds far and wide from suitable charities, business and individuals as well as Church members and interested village residents.

The task seemed formidable but was taken on willingly and sufficient cash was raised to make a start on Phase 1 - the toilet in the tower, quickly followed by the servery.

The meeting room proved rather more complicated with the removal of the 1885 Trustam Pipe Organ (now being rebuilt at St. Mary's, Harlington) and its replacement with a more compact Makin electronic organ. Thus the whole vestry was revamped with cupboards for clergy and choir robes, independent heating and ramps for access by the disabled.

The total cost was in the region of £90,000 - all raised as noted above plus the addition of proceeds from the lottery and various fetes.

Apart from a small retention all monies have now been paid to the contractors mainly Colson and Loaring of Ringstead for the tower work and servery, and Underwood and Weston of Northampton for the vestry conversions.

The pipe organ was dismantled by Michael Latham, our long term organ builder now working with Kenneth Tickell of Northampton, who will handle the rebuild at Harlington.

Not only are we indebted to Will Wilson for all his time and energy expended with the fund raising but to all those residents who contributed so freely - even the tax man as we were able to use Gift Aid on some donations.

That's the good news - during that time other requirements have come about either through new regulations or just natural wear and tear.

We need to upgrade access for the disabled in several areas, the electric circuitry, the hearing system and to refurbish the south porch - so keep up the donations.

Please come and inspect the works you have paid for and again many thanks.

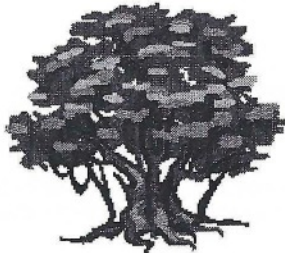

ECTON PAST

A brief insite into the 'Worthies' and trades people in Ecton in 1847 and again in 1914 using Kelly's Trade Directories. This is not looking at the population of Ecton as a whole. To do this, one would have to compare the Cencus 1851 to the Cencus of 1901, both which are now available and can be viewed at the Record Office. Some of the descendants of people found in the 1847 directory may still be found in the village in 1914, but not in trade. They may be farm or estate workers.

Between 1847 and 1914 there was a subtle change amongst the 'Worthies'. In 1847 only three 'Worthies' were named, Ambrose Isted, Lord of the Manor and the Rev. J.C. Whalley, Rector along with his curate Rev. J. Swainson who performed the everyday tasks in the church. Half a century later Mrs. Sotherby lives at Ecton House and the Rev. Jephson was the rector with no mention of a curate to help him. Also by 1914 there was a Baptist minister, J. Field, was he also John Turland Field - Butcher, or just a relative?

If you thought that women only gained independance in the 1960's look carefully at both lists. In 1847 we had women teachers, publicans and a carrier and in 1914 there were three ladies of Independant means as well as a beer retailer, farmer and market gardener.

Three men in 1847 showed initiative, Chas and Andrew Langley were wholesale boot manufacturers, grocers and butchers. The boots would have been made by farm labourers and their families in their own homes, the money earned being a valuable part of their income. Sixty seven years later a Geo. W. Langley was a shopkeeper and a carrier, was George carrying on the family tradition? John Wright was also a man of many talents, being a builder, wheelwright, blacksmith and timber merchant.

No mention of estate workers in 1847 but by 1914 the more important workers were mentioned by name and occupation, John Copnall - estate carpenter, John Earl - Farm Bailiff, Wm. Grey - Gamekeeper and William Smith - head gardener.

Although by 1914 Ecton Industrial Co-operative Society Ltd. was a flourishing concern there was a place for several small shopkeepers.

By 1914, the Parish Council was well established and a very public spirited Mr. Archibald Robinson was Parish Clerk, he was also an assistant overseer (probably connected with the union workhouse) and secretary of the Reading Recreation Room. He even found time to be an insurance agent.

If a Kelly's Directory for 2005 was composed one suspects the list would comprise of people like Charles Mabbutt and Thomas Goosey who lived in the village but worked in other places.

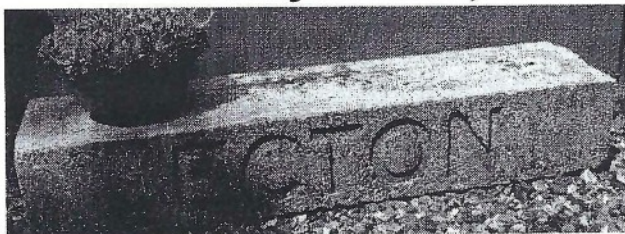

Monday 17th May 2005 at The Village Hall, Ecton at 7.30p.m.**

The Minutes of the meeting of the Annual Parish Meeting held on 17th May 2004 were approved and signed.

Chairman's Report

This is my first report since taking over from David Dicks. The year has been marked by two significant issues-further planning applications from Sywell airport and mineral extraction in the Nene valley. These will be reported on and discussed later in the general meeting, but remain an ongoing concern:

I have attended various activities in the village during the year, including the School fete, the flower festival, the official opening of the village hall and the Remembrance day service and parade, laying a wreath at the shrine on behalf of the Parish council.

The village continues to be affected by various anti- social behaviour including the dropping of litter, vandalism; fly tipping; spraying of graffiti and minor arson.

The Parish council strives to address these problems as best it can with the limited influence it has by bringing them to the attention of the relevant authorities.

At our last Parish Council meeting we had a long awaited visit from the Police in the form of Chief Inspector Mick Stamper, where all these matters were raised, together with the perceived lack of a Police presence in the village.

The Chief Inspector took our concerns on board, but the usual lack of resources and other priorities will not allow a greater Police presence- it seems.

It is in all our hands, however, to ensure that the village remains an attractive and safe environment to live in. It should also be borne in mind that all the council tax payers in the village end up paying for the damage caused to public property by the thoughtless acts of others.

On a lighter note, the Clean Campaign for Lower Ecton Lane has made a noticeable change for the better in the state of that area. Well done to all those involved!

This leads me to thank my fellow Parish Councillors for their support and assistance over the year. Particular thanks go to David Dicks for his help in my first year and to Bill Wilson for his expertise in planning matters.

Finally to John Wilson who carries out sterling work in his role of Clerk, my thanks on behalf of all the Parish Council.

Sywell Aerodrome

The applicant had now submitted a new application WP/2005/0163/F, to Wellingborough Council exactly the same as the previous one

Parish Council minutes continued

RESOLVED that this Council re-affirms its previously submitted objection to this application as detailed in letters to WBC dated 27th January 2000, 8th March, 2002 and 18th August 2004. Agreed that Wellingborough Borough Council be advised that the copy drawings provided for this application were totally inadequate. In future copies of the applicants submitted drawings to be provided.

The Parish Council considered a request from a parishioner for the provision of dog bins. Agreed that the Clerk asks WBC if they provide a service of help with the installation and emptying of these bins.
