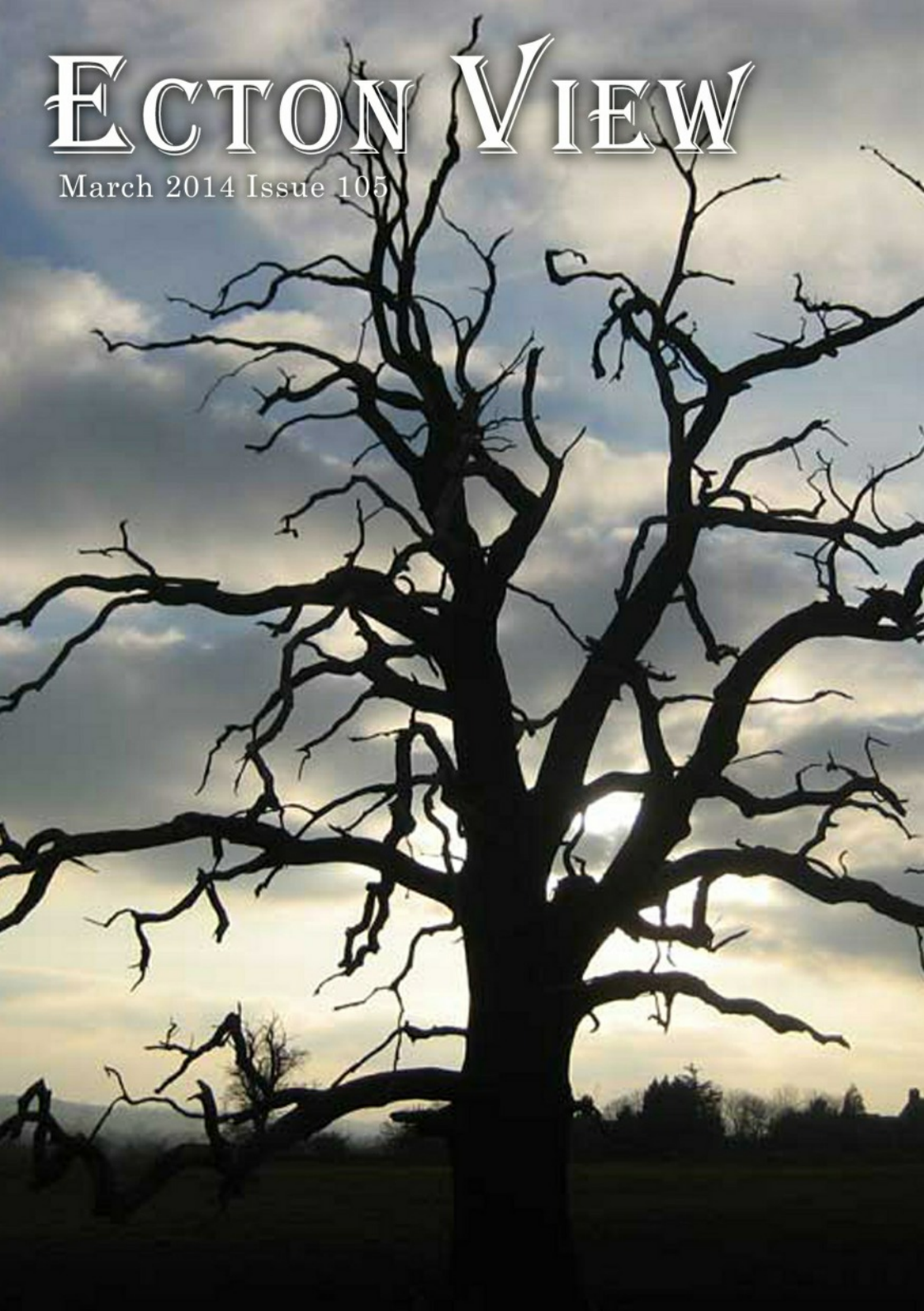

From the Rectory

I wrote last month of our family move from the Rectory to our own home, but that the office was remaining there for the time being. That situation still remains and we shall



inform readers when it changes. For the benefit of anyone who missed it last month, we have set up an additional telephone number for use when the office has no-one there although the original landline number is still in use. The new extra number is: 07908 470504. E-mail address also remains unchanged. All these details are also shown on the inside front cover of this magazine and the 'Who's Who' page.

Over the past few weeks I'm sure we have all been amazed and concerned at the plight of all those around the country whose lives have been disrupted by flood. Rainfall during January and into February has been record-breaking and the water table in many areas has been raised so much that the land cannot cope. All this, coupled with the fact that over the years more and more of our natural flood-plains have been built upon means that the water has no-where to go and hence the current problems with roads and railway tracks washed away as well as many domestic and industrial properties flooded and farmland turned into inland lakes. All of this is common knowledge and no doubt many of you will understand more of the detail than I, but I'm equally sure that many of us have been asking the question, 'why does God permit this to happen?'

I don't know the answer to that, but I am pretty sure that it's not sent by God as a punishment for this, that, or the other evil in our country. That's not how our God works. He is merciful and loving as well as just, and He is, I have no doubt, as upset as anyone here at what is going on. I also have no doubt that He will always work to bring some good out of these difficult situations if we permit Him. We do hear of communities being drawn closer together under adversity, for example, and while I would never suggest that this makes it all o.k., at the same time it does mean that God is working to ensure that at least something good can come from the difficult situations we encounter in life.

In March we once again enter the annual season of Lent (March 5th). This year, the day before (Shrove Tuesday) we are holding a pancake party as a drop-in for both adults and children, beginning straight after school (3.30pm) and continuing until 'last orders' at 7.30pm. This will be held in Ecton Church, but will be very much for all from our villages. Please do come and join us. As usual, there will be a special service of Holy Communion to mark the beginning of Lent on Ash Wednesday. This year it is the turn of Wilby to host this event at 7.30pm.

Finally, a word about Mothering Sunday, which falls at the end of the month (March 30th). As this is a fifth Sunday our normal practice would be to hold just one shared service in one of our churches, but we have decided that on this occasion, because this is a day when some people come to Church who are not regularly there, it is important that we should have a service in each building. We are therefore holding an 'All-Age' service in each village (Wilby at 9.15am, Great Doddington and Ecton at 11.00am) and the service at Great Doddington will include a celebration of Holy Communion so that there is a celebration somewhere in the benefice on that day. Soon after that it will be Easter and as usual all our events will be published in a special leaflet to be delivered throughout the three villages and the Wilby Way Estate.

94/13 RECORD ATTENDANCE, RECEIVE APOLOGIES AND APPROVE REASONS FOR ABSENCE

Apologies were received From Councillor B Brophy and Borough Councillor Mr J Bass

95/13 TO INVITE DECLARATIONS OF INTERESTS ON SUBJECTS INCLUDED ON THIS AGENDA

No declarations of interest were declared.

96/13 TO APPROVE MINUTES OF THE MEETINGS HELD ON 17TH SEPTEMBER 2013

Minutes of the Meeting of the Parish held on 17th September 2013 as previously circulated, were read, confirmed and signed as correct records.

97/13 PROGRESS ANY MATTERS ARISING FROM THE PREVIOUS MINUTES

Fisher German the agents of Ecton Estates arranged for repairs to the Estate Wall (that surrounds the perimeter of The Old Ecton Hall Estate), to be carried out as it was falling down in places. The foliage overgrowing onto the playing field does not belong to Ecton Estates. Clerk to contact MGWSP to request assistance trimming it back.

98/13 DISCUSS THE NEIGHBOURHOOD PLAN / LOCALISM BILL

No recent updates have been received with regards the progress of the Neighbourhood Plan. It was noted that the Neighbourhood Planning Group will need to organise a "Writer" someone who will be able to develop / write up the Neighbour Hood Plan.

99/13 DISCUSS ANY MINERAL EXTRACTION RELATED MATTERS

The Minerals and Waste Local Plan – Final Draft Plan (Proposed Submission) closed on the 31st October 2013. Clerk responded to points "MA5 - Earls Barton Extension (pages 100/101) and WS1 – Northampton East (pages 113 / 114) stating "The Council strongly insist that NO CONSTRUCTION TRAFFIC be allowed to travel through Ecton Village to the sites from Lower Ecton Lane. As this would have a detrimental effect on this small village and to the road surfaces that already have pot holes appearing regularly (and are not being repaired)".

VILLAGE SERVICES

100/13 DISCUSS ANY PLAYING FIELD RELATED MATTERS

Chair Councillor S Breshnahan has recently submitted a grant application to the Big Lottery Fund asking for funds to help with costs replacing some play equipment in the Playing Field.

101/13 DISCUSS ANY STREET LIGHTING RELATED MATTERS INCLUDING:

Including an accident on the Wellingborough Road / Northampton Road Junction

Two vehicles were recently involved in a collision on the Northampton Road which resulted in a Street Lighting Pole been damaged. The street lighting pole has been replaced and an insurance claim has now been settled and the claim closed.

The support pole to a road sign on the Northampton to Wellingborough Road (by the Worlds End Pub) is damaged. This has been reported to Street Doctor for repair.

The street light outside 67 High Street is obscured by overhanging foliage. Clerk has reported this to Fisher German – Agents of the property to report that this is a persistent problem and could they take action to prevent re-occurrence? Works are yet to commence. Clerk to continue to chase.

102/13 DISCUSS ANY ROADS/VILLAGE SIGNAGE/GRASS CUTTING RELATED MATTERS

All the overgrown foliage at the Worlds End Pub has now been cut back.

Clerk has continued to chase up MGWSP to remove the Ash Tree Stump that has been left in the ground, opposite 4 West Street. A representative of MGWSP will be inspecting the stump shortly.

Clerk has replied to resident Mr Maurice Creed regarding his recent letter of items requiring attention and reported the pot holes that need attention to Street Doctor.

WP/2013/0290/F – 4 West Street – 3 Detached Dwellings – Approved with conditions.

WP/2013/0407 – Ecton Estates – 2 Detached Dwellings with Detached Garaging – Site Viewing on 12.11.13 – Approved with Conditions.

WP/2013/0568 – Clayson Country Homes - Garden Land at 41 High Street – Non material amendment to planning ref: WP/2013/0155/F to add 3 no Velux Conservation Roof lights to each of the 2 garages. – Approved with conditions.

WP/2013/0513 – Mr Daniel Goodrick - 2 West Street – Erection of a two story rear extension and front porch – Approved with Condition.

106/13 OTHER PLANNING MATTERS NOT YET DETERMINED

Traffic and Road Obstructions – 41 High Street (3 Dwellings)

The Parish Council have received numerous complaints regarding obstructions to the High Street caused by construction vehicles used by the construction workers, who are working on site at 41 High Street. Some High Street residents have had their driveways blocked by vehicles and access along the high street has been restricted. Clerk to write to the developers Clayson Country Homes and Fisher German Estates to insist road / highway works are carried out as soon as possible and for the construction workers to keep the roads as clean as possible, due to the wet weather mud is being spread all over the road, making the road unsightly and potentially dangerous for drivers of cars.

There has been a report that the houses at 41 High Street are not been built in accordance to their original plans. Clerk has lodged an inquiry to the Planning Department at Wellingborough Borough Council (WBC). Councillor Fernley to contact the Planning Department at WBC to provide more information as requested to help assist them with their investigations.

Proposed Rural Area Housing Growth Session – update from Councillor Robert East

Councillor Robert East was unable to attend the recent Rural Area Housing Growth Session due to other commitments, but was able to give Councillors a brief overview of the meeting. Rural Housing targets were discussed at this meeting and an estimated figure of between 30 – 48 houses were determined to meet the expected Housing Development future needs of Ecton.

Earls Barton PC – Plans to downgrade Clay Lane Byways TC12 and TE11 to a bridleway.

Earls Barton Parish Council have contacted the Clerk to notify the Council of their plans to apply to Northampton County Council (NCC) to downgrade Clay Lane, Earls Barton, Byway TC12 and Byway TE11 to a bridleway. They have asked if Ecton Parish Council will support their application. It was resolved the Clerk would send a letter of support to Earls Barton Parish Council to be forwarded with their application to NCC.

Proposed Solar PV Farm – Wellingborough Road, Sywell

A recent public exhibition took place in the village of Mears Ashby reference a proposal for a Solar PV Farm on the Wellingborough Road, Sywell. No Councillors attended the meeting. No further actions are necessary.

Be Positive

Lent begins on 5th March. Whereas that may not quicken your pulse or get you reaching for the champagne, it is a wonderfully practical time of year. Lent is a chance to get real about the way we live as followers of Jesus Christ. Lent is an opportunity to take a spiritual health check. How? Lots of ways and here are just a few:

1. Even if you find silence difficult (I certainly do) spend five minutes in silence each day. Take a few words from the Bible, like “God so loved the world” or “Behold, I stand at the door and knock”, or whatever you have been reading – and turn them over in your mind in those silent five minutes. The words will stay with you all day. They will begin to shape your thinking – to challenge you and encourage you.

2. Be practical. It’s OK to give something up for Lent (like being a miserable bad tempered old soul) but better to take on something positive. For example: Take some time to write down the many blessings you have. Let’s get started ... Food in the cupboard, water in the tap, a bed to sleep on, a roof over your head, clean clothes to wear ... and then thank God for these wonderful things. Pray for those who are not as well off as you are. Then turn that prayer into practical action. How? Regularly giving food to your local food bank is a



simple and effective way of getting practical – not just in Lent, but every week.

3. Don’t forget that the 40 days of Lent do not include Sundays (add them up and see!). Every Sunday is a celebration of the resurrection. Jesus is alive and well and living in the Diocese of Peterborough. So when you are having your first coffee of your Sunday morning, or cracking open a bottle of red for Sunday lunch or unwrapping a bar of chocolate when you crawl in from your fifth service of the day ... think Fairtrade. Your enjoyment should also rub off on someone else.

And if none of these ideas fills you with enthusiasm for Lent, get on the internet and Google phrases like “Positive Lent”, or “Creative Lent” or “Ideas for Lent”. There are so many ideas that may just transform your Lent into a great run in to Easter. Enjoy!

Around the diocese

South Sudan challenge for Northants priest

Canon Derek Waller, vicar of St Peter's, Rushden for the past ten years, is planning to move with his wife Jane to South Sudan later this year.

The move follows an invitation from their long-standing South Sudanese friend, Bishop Anthony Poggo to re-visit the country where they had both worked in the 1980s. "Bishop Anthony invited us and our adult children to visit our old friends in South Sudan last year," Derek says. "It was a joyful time, as we renewed friendships and worshipped with local Christians. As we became aware of the many needs there, we felt a renewed call from God to serve the people and the church. There's tremendous openness, joy and faith there. We realised how much it would mean to them if we returned."

Derek and Jane will work in the Yei Diocese under Bishop Hilary. Yei is close to the border with both the Democratic Republic of Congo and Uganda, which is safe for Western aid workers.

Many of the Sudanese church pastors have had little education and so are unable to give church members very much teaching about the Christian faith. The Diocese hopes to re-start a college where Derek will focus on training and supporting clergy. Jane – who currently teaches ICT at Northampton College and is a serving magistrate – will both teach ICT and train others to teach it.

The biggest challenge facing the couple is raising about £25,000 a year to support their posts. Although they have



been accepted as CMS (Church Mission Society) partners, the Anglican agency now expects all its accredited workers to be self-financing.

"I'm thrilled that a priest with a settled role in the UK is willing to hear God's call to serve him in a more challenging part of the world," says Bishop Donald. "I hope parishes in the diocese will support Derek and Jane."

Derek will leave his current post in May before he and Jane embark on visits to link parishes and training to help prepare them for their new roles. They expect to move to South Sudan in the late autumn.

Bethlehem joins the Real Easter Egg campaign

A cooperative in Bethlehem is making tens of thousands of olive wood crosses for a special edition of the Real Easter Egg this year. It is the first time a cross has featured as part of a mainstream Easter gift.

The special edition egg is one of three new designs available, the other two being a sharing box with 20 smaller eggs and 20 Easter story booklets and the third is a boxed egg which comes with a 24 page Easter story book and some Chunky chocolate buttons.

Out of the 80 million Easter Eggs sold in the UK every year, the Real Easter Egg is the only one which tells the Easter story, gives money to charity and is Fairtrade.

"Each year it's a struggle to get the Real Easter Egg stocked in large enough

quantities by supermarkets," says David Marshall, from the Meaningful Chocolate Company. "So we send hundreds of thousands of eggs to churches that collect orders from their members and order directly from us online or through the post."

As the egg sells out every year the advice is to please order early. You can check which shops are stocking the egg or buy it at www.realeasteregg.co.uk.

To date, more than 450,000 Real Easter eggs have been sold.

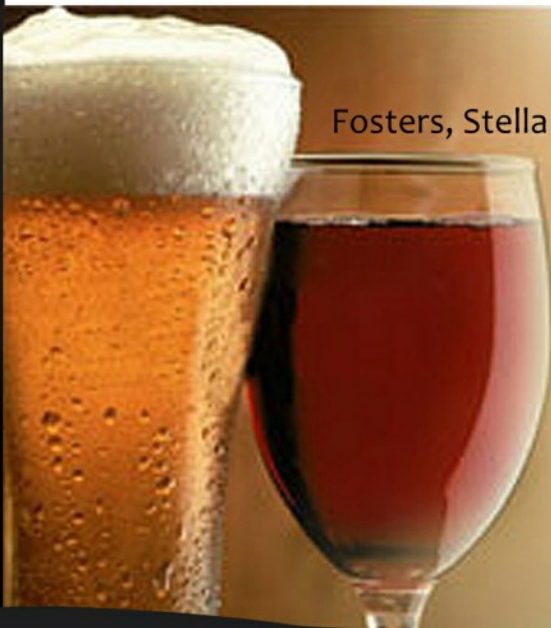
