From the Rectory

I do hope that all our readers had a very good Easter and that many of you will have joined us for one or more of our events during Holy Week. We've certainly been able to enjoy the lovely Spring weather over the past little while and many of us will have been busy in our gardens. That's true for me too. I love being in the garden, but am finding being responsible for that at the Rectory as well as the one at home quite a challenge and look forward to being able to find alternative accommodation for the office so that the Rectory can be returned to the diocese (to be let) and I am released from that responsibility. As usual I have a few days off after Easter and plan to spend most of it laying concrete paths in our new garden – weather permitting, of course.



Following the wonderful success of our pancake party, about which I wrote last month, in all three churches we are now looking for more opportunities to engage with our local communities, both to welcome folk into our lovely buildings and also to come out and meet you where you are, wherever that may be. We already mount teams in the regular pub quiz at Ecton, and we are hoping to organise this year an open-air Harvest celebration in collaboration with the folk at the allotments at Great Doddington in the Autumn. We are also concerned to mark appropriately the centenary of the First World War. At Great Doddington we are working to that end with the URC chapel and the Heritage Group, but in all three villages over the next four years we are planning to keep the centenary anniversaries of the deaths of those servicemen from the villages who fell. That will at least be with special prayers in Church on the nearest Sunday, but perhaps a little more than that. If any readers would like to suggest other events at which we may work with other village groups please do come forward with ideas – we're very ready to listen. Please remember, all three of our Church buildings are now better adapted for wider community events, so please ask if you wish to use them. They're your buildings, not just ours, and it's important that they should be open and used as much as possible. This is especially true in Wilby, which has no other real community space.

Readers from Great Doddington will have seen in the March magazine an article from our new archdeacon, the Ven. Richard Ormston. I have known Richard well for very many years and have the utmost respect for him. I have no doubt that he will have a very positive effect, not only upon this half of the diocese which is his particular concern, but upon the diocese as a whole. He has a special brief for growth and reaching out to our communities and I know that's very much where his heart and his particular abilities lie. In business terms the archdeacons in the Church of England are effectively the 'line managers' of the parish clergy and I look forward very much to working closely with him in the future.

At the very end of this month comes Ascension Day (May 29th). A much neglected festival because it falls neither on a Sunday nor (in this country) on a public holiday, it is nevertheless very important in the Christian calendar, marking the conclusion of the whole Easter story. Jesus returned to His Father in heaven and sat down, His 'phase' of the work completed, leaving us to get on with 'phase two' – reaching out with God's love to the world. We always celebrate this occasion with an evening service and this year it is the turn of Great Doddington to host it. Please do come and join us.

As an experienced fly fisherman, I have been approached to write an article this month. This month's fishing outing took me to Manningford Trout Fishery, in the heart of the Wiltshire countryside. Using a Thomson & Thomson weighted 5 rod, myself and chums made our way to 1 of 2 fishing lakes, named Manor Lake, where we discussed which type of Fly would be most suited to the conditions. I cast with an Orange Montana on a floating line, with a tapered leader, and left this to sink whilst counting down, then pulled back on a fast retrieve. After 5 or 6 casts, the Montana was taken and subsequently the 2.9lb rainbow trout was landed. I decided to have a change of fly to an Orange Damsel, with superb results of 3 further rainbow trout. After lunch at The Red Lion, I then changed to a Pheasant Tail Nymph, and this successfully caught another trout. I tied another Montana on my line and this landed me my sixth and biggest fish of the day, weighing in at 3.9lb. Overall a very successful fishing trip and would recommend this trout fishery to The Ecton View readers.

ASPARAGUS SOUP

Serves 4

Tall Tin of asparagus pieces (keep some spears for garnish)

1 oz butter

Small chopped onion or leek

1 oz flour

$\frac{3}{4}$ pint chicken stock

$\frac{3}{4}$ pint creamy milk

Sweat onion in butter, add flour and stock. Add asparagus. Bring to boil

Add milk and liquidise. Add extra spears.

This is a simple yet quite delicious soup which is usually served hot but I am sure would be just as good served cold on a hot summer evening.





A teacher from Northamptonshire who saved a toddler from drowning has won a prestigious national first aid trophy.

Simon Underwood, 40, from Ecton was named as the winner of the Everyday Hero of the Year category for the charity's national awards. One of the flagship awards at the event, this award recognises an adult individual who has saved a life with first aid or has made an extraordinary first aid achievement.

HRH The Countess of Wessex and TV presenter Tess Daly joined a host of stars to celebrate the nation's most inspirational life savers at St John Ambulance's Everyday Heroes awards, held at the Lancaster London hotel on Wednesday.

Simon saved the life of a toddler at Northamptonshire holiday park Billing Aquadrome in the Summer of 2013. He resuscitated the 15-month-old child, after the boy was found floating in a stream. Thanks to his efforts, Simon managed to get the child breathing again before the ambulance arrived. The child was rushed to hospital and kept in intensive care where it is believed he then went on to make a full recovery.

Sue Killen, Chief Executive of St John Ambulance and Chair of Judges for Everyday Heroes said: 'These Everyday Heroes are an inspiration to us all. Anyone can learn first aid but not enough people do. Whether you download a free app or go on a two hour course, it's so easy to learn. We urge everyone to follow these life savers' lead so you too can be the difference between life and death.'

Book Club - April

Gone Girl

by Gillian Flynn



Description:

On a warm summer morning in North Carthage, Missouri, it is Nick and Amy Dunne's fifth wedding anniversary. Presents are being wrapped and reservations are being made when Nick's clever and beautiful wife disappears. Husband-of-the-Year Nick isn't doing himself any favours with cringe-worthy daydreams about the slope and shape of his wife's head, but passages from Amy's diary reveal the alpha-girl perfectionist could have put anyone dangerously on edge. Under mounting pressure from the police and the media—as well as Amy's fiercely doting parents—the town golden boy parades an endless series of lies, deceptions, and inappropriate behaviour. Nick is oddly evasive, and he's definitely bitter—but is he really a killer?

Review:

Some readers found that it was not the easiest book to get through whilst others reported zipping through it in a matter of days. The consensus was that it was mildly disappointing and did not live up to the hype, although it will probably make a great film. It was a very predictable read; many readers had picked up on the "twist" very early on and therefore found that the surprise turn of events lacked the shock value the author was looking for.

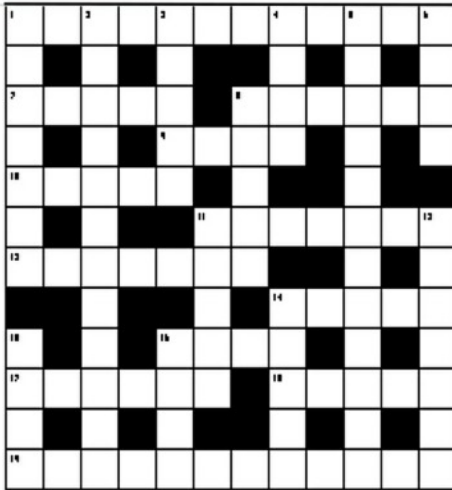

Eyes on the Prize

In a sleepy churchyard in rural Northamptonshire is a crumbling, illegible gravestone that forms the starting point for an epic artistic and historical journey...

The Church of St Mary Magdalene in Ecton is the resting place of Thomas Franklin, uncle of Benjamin Franklin, one of the Founding Fathers of the United States of America. Benjamin visited England and the grave in the 1750s, and even considered buying back his family's homestead in the village. A likeness of Benjamin even features on the village sign, which was erected to mark the millennium. Like his famous nephew, Thomas Franklin was an inventor, who designed a remarkable and unique automatic chiming clock for Ecton's church.



Northamptonshire's links with American history don't end with the Franklins. A few miles down the road is Sulgrave Manor, the ancestral home of George Washington, and the family coat of arms emblazoned above the manor's porch is said to have influenced the design of the Stars and Stripes. Another Washington is buried at Great Brington church, on the estate where Princess Diana was laid to rest.

I'm a British cartoonist, and Ecton is my home. Thomas Franklin's grave is situated 150 yards from my front door, and is still visited by Americans today, who leave dollar coins on the headstone as tributes. So, when an American friend suggested I make a bold attempt to win a hugely popular art contest in her father's home state of Michigan, I turned for inspiration to my county's links to two of the greatest figures in U.S. history. The competition in question is ArtPrize which is an open, international event, founded by the DeVos family who created the Amway business phenomenon. For nineteen autumn days, downtown Grand Rapids in Michigan becomes a vast public gallery, and art from around the world pops up in every corner of the town. One of the top prizes, awarded by public vote, is a purse of \$200,000. To a freelance artist, this is too good an opportunity to miss. But the challenge is daunting.

The piece I intend to produce – entitled *The Great Seal* – will be a gigantic caricature that incorporates the fascinating history of some of America's most important and recognizable national emblems, and the people who helped forge them. In order to stand a fighting chance of winning over an American audience, I must travel to Michigan, and produce the artwork,



which will measure six by nine feet – a scale on which I have never worked before. The Holland Museum in Michigan has very kindly offered me a lovely room in which I can paint, and we hope to set up a webcam for a live internet feed of me doing so. I must also find a prestigious public space in Grand Rapids where the painting can be displayed and viewed by as many people as possible, so that it has the best shot at gleaning public votes.
