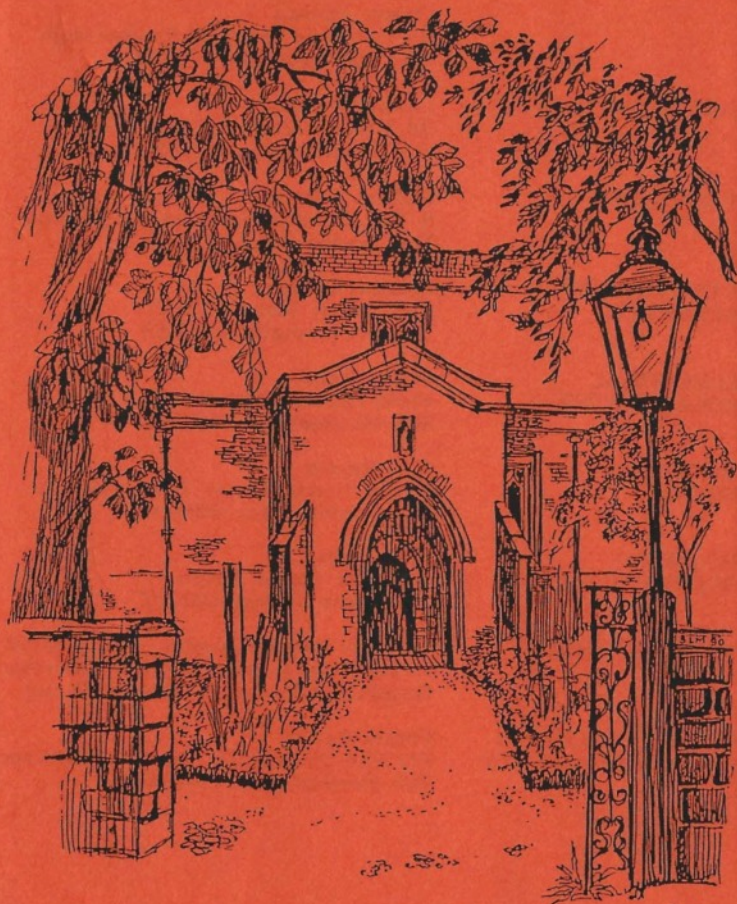

From the Rector's Study

When I was young it seemed to me as if church going was a pattern of behaviour that was never questioned. Those who went to church had been attending all their lives and were known as church-goers but the majority of the villagers made very little attempt to attend regularly, going only for the rites of passage, baptisms, weddings and funerals.

I have noticed a great change in the church during my lifetime. There are many more church-goers who are taking the Faith seriously. They are asking questions about their belief and behaviour. They are reflecting upon the church's apparent failure to cut any ice with most people who live in this country. We need to remind ourselves of the rapid expansion of the church in Nigeria were there are not sufficient Bishops to Confirm great numbers of candidates coming forward. Church attendance is still relatively high in the United States of America, although we are told that there has been a falling away in recent years. I notice how many of the Christians who attend Ecton House for retreats and conferences are working conscientiously and seriously at their faith in Jesus Christ and I know from countless conversations I have with visitors here that their desire for closer union with God is sincere and heartfelt.

The time has come for us to kick into touch the notion that the Faith is only for a small minority of church-goers. Many people are now acknowledging that political systems and cultural behavioural patterns are not sufficient to bring about a deeprooted spiritual happiness. The State cannot go to the heart of the matter and although learning is of massive importance a highly developed intellect does not necessarily give peace of mind.

For me, like many others, Jesus Christ is the centre of my life. This coming Holy Week we will relive the journey to Jerusalem and that lonely Cross on a Hill in Jerusalem. Jesus identified himself entirely with the human condition and he knows how difficult life can be. We pray that in this village and throughout the land there will be a fresh turning to Him who rises above poverty of spirit, power struggles in Church and State and man's inhumanity to man. We pray too that the Glory of God will shine filling our church with light and that there will be a great sense of holiness at this festival. Remember that it is never too late to change. Christians on the road to eternal life can be described as those who desire change for the better with Jesus their Risen Lord and Master as the prime example.

There has been no Parish Council meeting since the last magazine but there are a few matters that should be mentioned.

First, you will be aware by now that the roads have been thoroughly swept through the village to remove the excess gravel from the surface. We are assured that the remedial work to restore the surface will take place during the coming financial year.

Secondly, by the time you read this work should be underway with the refurbishment of the playground equipment and the installation of the new pieces together with its safety surfacing. We have been most fortunate to receive such a generous grant from Wellingborough Council and will no doubt be the butt of many comments from other Parishes at the next joint Parishes Meeting!

Lastly, we have been encouraged by the response to our requests for help in carrying out a traffic survey in the village. This will take place between 7.00 a.m. and 7.00 p.m. on Thursday, 9th, Friday, 10th and Saturday, 11th April. It would be a help if each of the cars in the village could display the sticker enclosed with this magazine, (if you need more then please ask Sheila Ingram for extra ones). This will help to distinguish villagers and differentiate between those just visiting or passing through. We are not guaranteed a traffic calming programme in the village but at least if the ground work is done we shall have the evidence to support our cause.

SAINTS DAYS

DO THE SAINTS MEAN ANYTHING TO ME?

Yes, I find it very helpful to remember the Saints because their lives not only show their love of God but also how that love affected their lives. Reading about the Saints is fascinating not just for the wisdom of the scholars or the piety of the mystic ones, but for the example they provide of how their faith changed their behaviour and relationships. The sharp end of faith for us as for them is its application to the day-to-day details of living. The Saints show me how they faced up to applying their love of God to their lives, not always successfully - never easily - but always persistently, that's a great encouragement to me.

I only pray to the Blessed Virgin Mary, as I feel she is unique among the Saints. As the Mother of our Lord she had the closest human relationship with him throughout his life. Tradition says that she lived with St John until she died in her 70's and contributed to the quality of his Gospel. Now she has a special place as Queen of Heaven, and special concern for the conversion of sinners. All her recorded appearances, past or present seem to be full of her humility and love for her Son. She gently offers to lead us in obedience and trust to him for healing and forgiveness. As she embraced her Son, so now and forever she reaches out embracing arms to us sinners, I am glad to be held by her in His presence, oh yes, the Saints are definitely important to me.

Edith was a much loved member of this village community and she is remembered for her devotion to her church. A LETTER FROM THE BISHOP OF BRIXWORTH

Dear Friends

CELEBRATION OF THE CHRISTIAN FAITH 1992

I am writing to you wearing my hat as Chairman of the Board for the Development of Ministry in this Diocese, to commend to you a special weekend of Celebration that is taking place on Sunday, 3rd May and Bank Holiday Monday, 4th May. If I was a military man I would be tempted to call the weekend "Operation Hidden Treasure" because in it we are seeking to bring to light the treasures of the Christian faith that we share, and to bring them to people's attention in ways which will widen and deepen the vision and practice of that faith for ourselves and others. It is one of the initiatives being taken by the Peterborough Diocese to forward the Decade of Evangelism.

Members of the Parish Resource Group and others are working together on what promises to be an exciting and creative couple of days.

To take the second day first. On Bank Holiday Monday, 4th May, there will be a great Diocesan Gathering at All Saints' Middle School, Boughton Green Road, Northampton. From 10.00 a.m. to 5.00 p.m. through worship, well-known guest speakers, seminars, workshops and play (sporting activities in the nearby Benham Hall) we want to highlight and focus upon some of the central themes and treasures of our faith. There will be something of interest for everyone, with a creche for the very youngest. The gymnasium at All Saints' will be set up as a Christian market with stalls and exhibitions promoting various Christian organisations and firms, and there will be opportunities for finding out about the resources available.

We hope very much that each parish will be widely represented on that day, so please make every effort to ensure that yours is. We are planning a gigantic visitors' book, and it would be lovely to have signatures in it from every parish in the Diocese, as a lasting memento of an historic pilgrimage day. Why not book coaches and bring people from the whole community? Do come for the whole day if you can, but certainly try to be there for the outdoor Holy Communion service which will take place at 12.00 noon.

On the first day, Sunday, 3rd May, we hope that every church in the Diocese, large or small, will go out of its way to have an Open Day. Let the bells ring. Let Spring flowers abound. Let the doors be open and every invitation possible be given to join in worship with guest services, parties, picnics, exhibitions, concerts, sporting events, whatever you plan and know that you do well.

The object of the day, and the whole weekend, is to help us all to appreciate and understand more deeply what we have to offer in the lasting treasures of the Spirit as Jesus taught and showed us, and to express them in ways that are helpful to other people.

Enclosed with this letter are some leaflets given outline information, which we would ask you to distribute to each member of your congregation. You will also find the same number of cards for distribution, on which is printed a prayer which has been written especially for the Celebration. We ask that this be included in the prayers at services during Lent and on Easter Sunday. The leaflet entitled "20 Things to do on 3rd May" simply gives a number of suggestions for making this day one which will include the whole community.

A final request. To defray the costs of the Celebration we are inviting every church to have a special offering on Easter Day, asking that every adult present give a minimum of fifty pence to help launch the Celebration successfully. Perhaps this could be received as part of the worship, and associated with the prayer for the event.

CHRISTIAN STEWARDSHIP

On 6th March Henry Pinney and Bob Allison went to a meeting for all Church Wardens and Treasurers. At this meeting the Chairman of the Diocesan Board of Finance outlined the cash problems facing the Church over the next few years.

The drop in property values, investment income and rents received has reduced the income going to Church Commissioners. On the other hand the increasing number of clergy who are retiring has caused the cost of pensions to rise.

The result is a levelling off in the amount of money which can be given to the Diocese to fund our own clergy.

The shortfall will have to be made up by the people in the pew digging deeper into their pockets.

This will be the theme for our Stewardship Campaign in December. You have been warned!
