## JOHN STAINER

John Stainer was born in London in 1840 and died in Italy in 1901 aged sixty.

He was the son of a musical parish schoolmaster and became a choirboy at St Paul's Cathedral.

After completing his musical studies, he returned to St Paul's Cathedral as Organist, and he was knighted for his services to music, by Queen Victoria in 1888.

One of his larger scale choral works, *The Crucifixion* (written in 1887), is to be performed in Ecton Parish Church on Wednesday, 12th April at 7.30 pm.

The performance will be sung by the combined choir of Great Billing and Earls Barton with our own choir members also included.

The two soloists are Mr John Bandey - Tenor  
and Mr Gordon Larkman - Bass

We are very pleased to have this opportunity to work together with our two neighbouring parishes and we do hope that the performance will be well attended, and that it may arouse more interest and enthusiasm for choir work in our own parish.

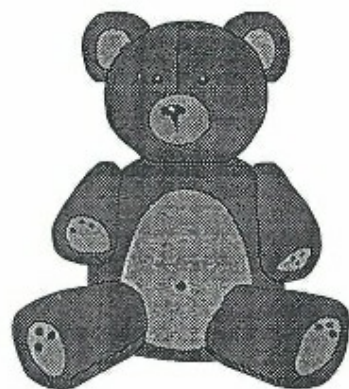

Behind the changes is a desire for our church to grow, reaching out to those who are outside our normal worshipping activity.

The matter will be discussed at the Annual Parochial Meeting on 2nd April and will be high on the Agenda of the newly appointed church council.

## THE FAMILY SERVICE

It is with some diffidence that I write about this new service introduced four months ago for an experimental period of six months. I do so not in criticism but to articulate the views of some parishioners including myself.

First, all seem to have welcomed the attempt to bridge the gap between "*the church*" and those who do not worship regularly or who have little contact or knowledge of the gospel.

Unfortunately, not all Sunday School children attend, with or without their parents, but it is a family service and not a substitute for Sunday School. The growth in the Sunday School has been a joy to us all and we support this work wholeheartedly.

The service with its modern lively hymns is well received but does need a structure and instruction suitable to adults as well as children. This would be welcomed by many parishioners.

Then there is the loss of our "*Family*" Communion on the first Sunday. An evening 1662 Said Service is not a satisfactory substitute and, clearly, this does not meet the needs of some parishioners.

If we are to encourage the support of the Family Service and its welcome outreach some change is necessary. As this service only lasts for 40 minutes it would be possible to hold an ASB Communion Service (said) at 10.30 am or thereabouts, possibly in the Chapel depending on numbers. This would avoid the inclination to worship at another church, particularly during the winter dark nights.

I am sure the Rector and Parochial Church Council would welcome your views before June, the end of the experimental period.

We are following the guidelines which our friends in Luton have taught us:

- 1 Get on with the job!
- 2 Have almost as many volunteers as clients.
- 3 Adopt a tough, no-nonsense approach, with a down to earth Christian piety.
- 4 Allow your clients to have self respect and dignity: arrange for them to pay a small amount for meals and other services.
- 5 Food and warmth are the first requirements, but as things develop, other needs will follow and steps can be taken to respond to them.
- 6 Aim to have six months' funding in hand. Then if a dire emergency ever occurred, you would have enough money to close down! I am happy to report that Daylight now has this financial security, but we have no intention of closing down!

#### NEWS FROM THE DAYLIGHT CENTRE - Mrs Peggy Hawker

The Daylight Centre is "up and running" and the number of clients using the centre is rising steadily. In the first two weeks attenders increased from two to eight and then in the following four, from 11 to 55. There are now over 30 people who visit regularly and we are serving about 15 meals each day.

This is one of our biggest headaches as we have not yet been able to recruit a cook. Volunteers are doing a wonderful job in providing meals, but we hope to be able to relieve them of this burden soon. Many of our clients are lonely and come to the centre to talk to people and we want to free our volunteers for just this purpose.

The majority of clients live in bed and breakfast accommodation, although a small number move from place to place searching for somewhere to "lay their heads". Most are in the 30 to 50 year age range, but our youngest regular is just seven months and the oldest is over 80. The male to female ratio is 60:40. Most of those who visit regularly feel that they "own" the Centre and appear to be very proud of it.

We were delighted to pass with flying colours a recent Environmental Health inspection. The Environmental Health Officer was most complimentary about the way the kitchen was run and about the number of volunteers who had obtained their food hygiene certificates. This reflects the hard work of our manager, Stephen Loveless.

The showers, which have been donated by Texas Homecare are installed and look superb. This will enable us to start a full programme of activities upstairs by Easter, including showers, laundry and clothing club.

Although we have over 50 volunteers, we would welcome more, especially anyone who is able to help with washing or ironing! We shall need two people from 1pm to 3.30pm each day, so if you have an afternoon free once a week, or once a fortnight, and would be prepared to help, we would be delighted to hear from you!

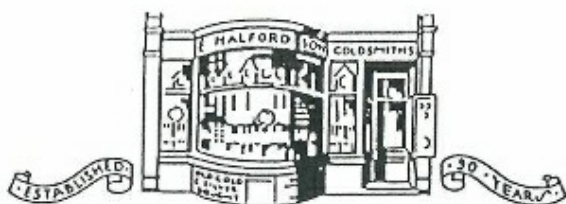
