FROM THE RECTOR'S STUDY

Most parish churches in the Church of England honour the saint in whose name they are dedicated. On the weekend of the 22nd and 23rd July, we will be holding our Patronal Festival, known traditionally, and affectionately, as the Ecton Feast. This is the second year of its revival and I hope that the practice of keeping it will continue for many years ahead.

Saint Mary Magdalene was one of the close friends and disciples of Jesus. You will see in the special article distributed with this magazine how the uniqueness of this Mary can be an inspiration to all who follow Christ. I hope you will read and learn from this scholarly exposition and be reminded that the dedication of the church with the name of a saint is no trivial matter. Our salvation depends upon the quality of our discipleship and we are fortunate that in the life of Mary Magdalene we find a superb role model.

A special peal of bells will delight the ear on the morning of the 22nd July. A *Flower Festival* based on hymn titles is being planned for the Church and in the Rectory Room an exhibition of *Arts and Crafts*. You are invited to view the *Flower Festival* and the *Exhibition of Arts and Crafts* on Saturday, 22nd and Sunday, 23rd July between 1 and 5 pm. Coffee and tea will be served in church.

The purpose of the festival is not one of fund raising. It is a time for religious reflection and celebration providing an opportunity to raise the spirituality of our experience as humble learners in the footsteps of Jesus.

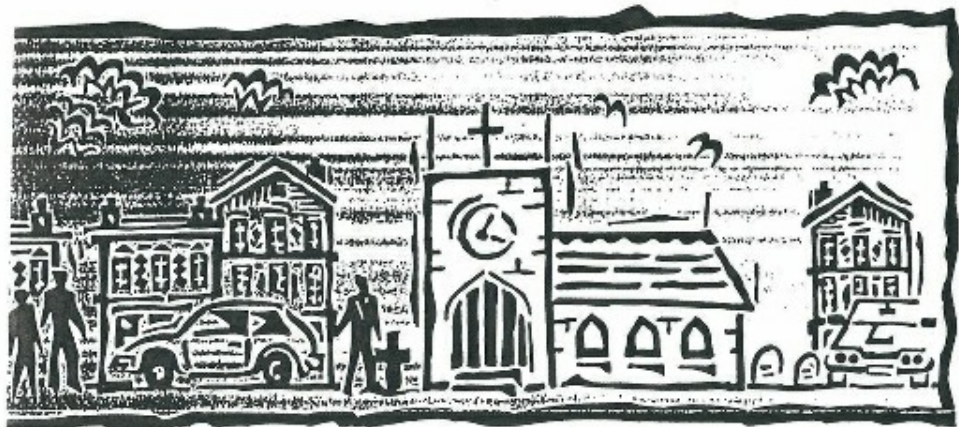

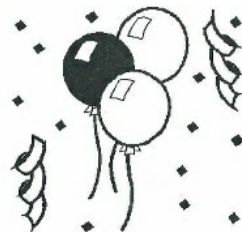

MARY MAGDALENE

What do we know about Mary Magdalene?

Let us see what the Bible tells us about her.

The first we hear of her is in Luke, Chapter 8, verses 1-3. Then we hear no more of her until the Crucifixion, when Matthew, Mark, Luke and John all tell of her being present; we also hear of her as being the first person to see Jesus after His resurrection. These occurrences are found in the following scriptures:-

Matthew 27:55-56 and 61; also 28:1-10.

Mark 15:40-41 and 47; also 16:1-11.

Luke 23:49 and 55-56; also 24:10.

John 19:25 and 20:1-2 and 10-18.

It is also likely that Mary Magdalene was one of the 'women' in Acts 1:14, and also among those in the house when the Holy Spirit descended on them at Pentecost (Acts 2:1-4).

So why is she often thought of as a reformed prostitute, or 'sinful woman'?

This all started in the time of Gregory the Great in the 6th century, when he identified Mary Magdalene with Mary of Bethany, and also the 'woman who had lived a sinful life' in Luke 7:36-50. This identification has never been accepted by the Eastern tradition, and in the writings of the Eastern Fathers.

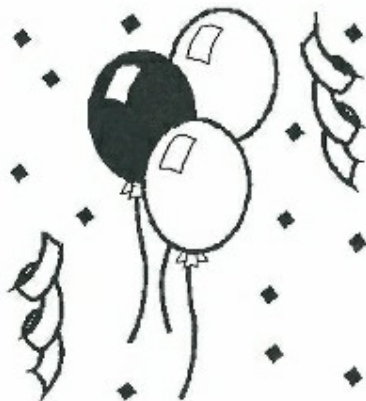
Not many people now identify Mary Magdalene with Mary of Bethany (the sister of Martha and Lazarus) but still tend to identify her with the unnamed sinner in Luke 7, although there is absolutely no Biblical basis for this. The only reason for this identification seems to be that in the four stories of the anointing of Jesus by a woman, one (Luke) says it was at the house of a Pharisee named Simon (without saying where the house was) and this is the one that mentions that the woman was a sinner. Both Matthew (26:6) and Mark (14:3) tell the story, and place it in the house of a man known as Simon the Leper, in Bethany, but do not state that the woman was a known sinner. John tells of an occasion when in the house of Martha and Lazarus, Mary took a pint of pure lard and poured it on Jesus' feet and wiped his feet with her hair. If this is the same occasion, why does it specify in one instance that it was at the house of Lazarus and Martha, and in the other two that it was at the house of Simon the Leper? From what we know of Mary of Bethany from other parts of the Gospels, isn't it more likely that she had heard of the happening at the house of Simon the Leper (after all Bethany is not very big) and decided she would like to do likewise? Whether this is one occasion, or an original and then a copy, there is no justification for identifying Mary Magdalene (which means Mary of Magdala) with the story. Bethany is a village just outside of Jerusalem, whereas Magdala is in Galilee (about 75 miles north of Jerusalem). Going back to our introduction of Mary Magdalene in Luke chapter 8, the fact that she had been delivered from seven demons in no way marks her as a woman of ill-repute - after all, the little lad at the foot of the Mount of Transfiguration (whose symptoms sound remarkably like Epilepsy) also had a spirit (or demon) cast out of him.

So from what we know of Mary Magdalene from the Bible, what can we learn from her?

Firstly, she followed Jesus. Where He went, she followed. She and the other women from Galilee mentioned in Luke 8, saw to His needs, and the needs of the disciples, in a practical way, without demanding anything in return. We too can follow Jesus and walk in the ways He directs us by His Holy Spirit. How can we supply His needs? Think of the words of Jesus in Matthew 2 "I tell you the truth, whatever you did for one of the least of these brothers (or sisters) of mine, you did for me." And James (who was the Lord's brother) in his epistle says (Chapter 2:15 and 16) "suppose a brother or sister is without clothes and daily food. If one of you says to him 'Go, I wish you well: keep warm and well fed', but does nothing about his physical needs, what good is it?" So whenever we help anyone who has less than we have and is in need, or when we give to Christian Aid, Oxfam, Save the Children etc., we are supplying the needs of Christ in the same way that Mary Magdalene did.

Secondly, she was devoted to Jesus right to the end - or what she thought then was the end. At the Crucifixion, the only one of the disciples mentioned as being there was John (in the Gospel of John), whereas all four Gospels mention that Mary Magdalene was there together with the Mother of Jesus and one or two women who had followed Him from Galilee. It was Mary Magdalene and Mary the Mother of Jesus who came to the tomb to anoint His body with spices - so early in the morning that it was still dark; none of the disciples were with them, even though they thought they would need to remove a heavy stone from the entrance to the tomb. Likewise, our devotion to Jesus, and our need to draw near to His Cross, should not rely on others. If we love Jesus as Mary Magdalene did, we will not say "I would go to Church, or pray, or whatever, if only my husband/wife/friend would come too", but will lead the way, and pray that those we love will eventually follow.

Mary Magdalene was the first person that Jesus appeared to after His Resurrection, and in at least one of the Gospels it states that when she went to tell the disciples about this they did not believe her. However, she held on to her belief, and was proved right when Jesus appeared also to the disciples and others. We too should hold on to our belief in Jesus as the Incarnate Son of God, who died and rose again that we might have life eternal, even when others show clearly that they think we are wrong to believe.

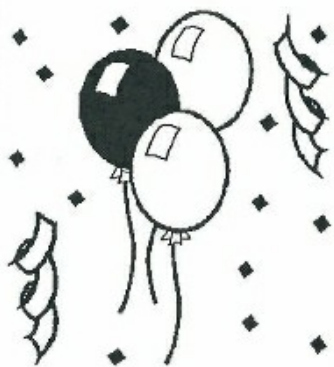

The late Mervyn Stockwood, who was well-known as the Bishop of Southwark, spoke these words at a farewell service in Great St Mary's, Cambridge.
