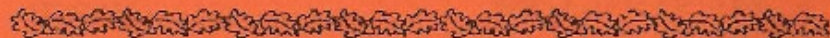

Dear Friends,

Lent 2000

"I invite you.... in the name of the Church, to the observance of a Holy Lent" (from the order for Ash Wednesday).

For Christians to experience the resurrection life of Easter, they must look carefully at what needs putting right in their lives. So the Church calls us to be quiet for a season and to reflect and pray, giving up some of our distractions.

Penitence means making changes for the better. We ask God to forgive all that is past and to lead us out from darkness to walk as children of light.

Fasting means not being constantly worried about what we eat and drink. When that kind of anxiety is not pressing, then there is time for other more important things – such as Bible study and prayer. We can be unhurried and purposeful.

Giving. Jesus applauds the person who secretly loves and gives without expecting any return. What new acts of charity does God call us to this Lent? It may not be a matter of just giving money but perhaps of giving time – seeing and responding to a need quietly, without fuss.

Let's begin Lent in the right way by coming to the Ash Wednesday Holy Communion Service at 7.30 pm on March 8th. As the ashes are imposed the priest says "Remember that you are dust, and to dust you shall return. Turn away from sin and be faithful unto Christ."

Pray for grace to keep Lent faithfully.

Take God seriously; take Lent seriously – but don't take yourself too seriously. Self-concern stops growth in faith!

After the storm

In October 1998, Hurricane Mitch hit Central America, killing thousands of people and leaving two million homeless. The disaster provoked a worldwide relief effort. In the UK and Ireland, people of all ages helped fill five banana boats with emergency supplies to the value of over £1.25 million.

Marvin Flores Picado is 14 and lives in Matagalpa in Nicaragua. He remembers when the hurricane struck: it rained continuously for four days and nights, and people didn't see the sun for seven days. He says: 'I was asleep when it all started, but by the time my mum woke us all up, the water had already entered the house and was up to our knees.

We had to leave the house really quickly because the water was rising so fast. We left in what we were wearing, each of us boys carrying one of our sisters. We went to a large hall where we lived for a month with over 200 other families.'

Marvin's six-year-old sister Caralis still has nightmares about the hurricane. Whenever it rains at night she wakes up crying and sits bolt upright, terrified and unable to go back to sleep.

The Community Movement of Matagalpa (MCM), which is supported

by Christian Aid, was quick to provide food and medicine for people made homeless by the hurricane and soon set about repairing and rebuilding homes. A year after Mitch, Marvin and his family were able to move to a new home outside the city, where 40 houses are being built for Mitch survivors.

MCM is also helping Marvin through its backing for the Support Centre for Working Children (CANTC). Marvin works as a shoe-shine boy at one of Matagalpa's city markets, and CANTC provides educational and recreational activities for children like him who need to work to boost their families' income, on condition that they also go to school.

Marvin charges 1 córdoba (5p) per shoe-shine and on an average day he earns around 25 córdobas (£1.35). After a morning shining shoes he goes to CANTC for his lunch, and to school in the afternoon. At CANTC Marvin is also learning a new trade – sewing, and he hopes one day to have a sewing machine and to be a tailor – if he doesn't make it as a professional footballer, that is!

After the storm, the future is at last looking brighter for Marvin and his family and others like them.

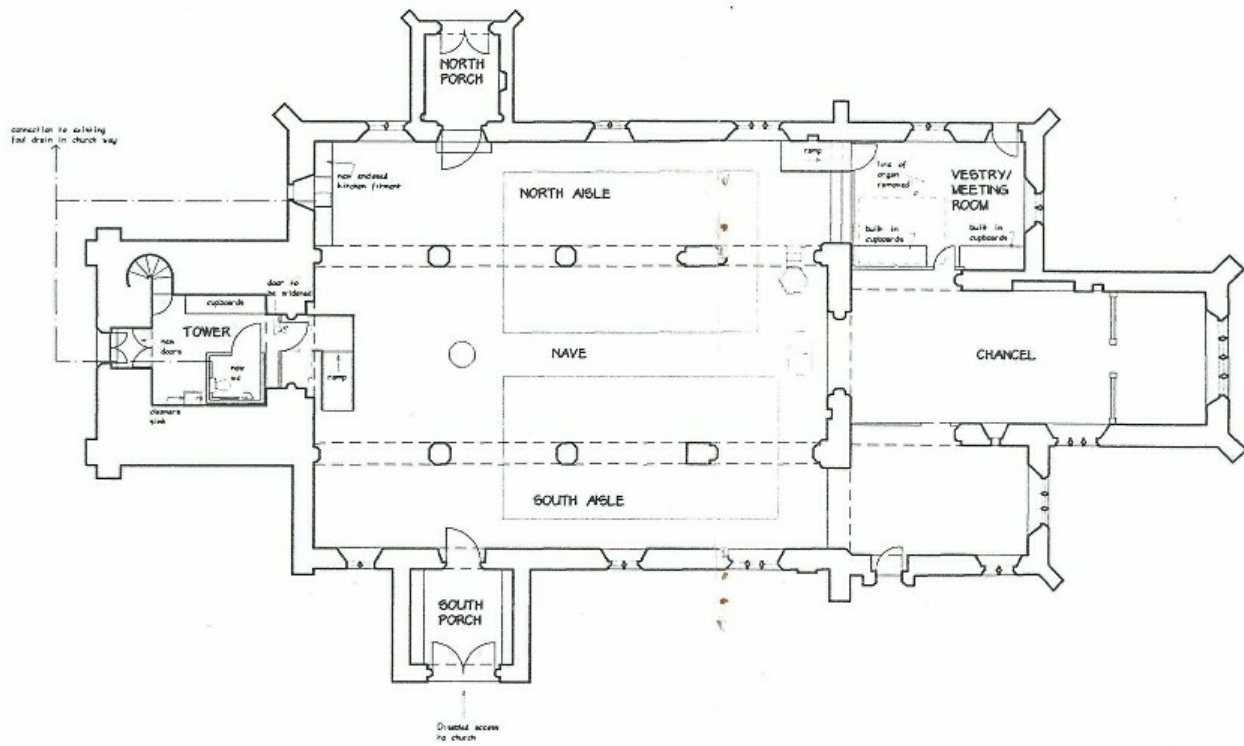
ITEMS FROM THE PCC

Notes from Ecton Parish Council Meeting held on 15 January 2000

Present: David Dicks (Chairman), Cheryl Gyte, Sheila Ingram, Sylvia Saunders, Maurice Creed, Tony Green, Ty Moffett and Bill Wilson. Councillor Kate Payne also attended.

Matters arising from the Minutes

Church Rooms

A meeting with the Archdeacon provided advice concerning loans and grants that might be available for the PCC when considering a replacement for the Church Rooms.

Millennium Projects

It was reported that the new stone wall, notice board and carved sign were complete and insurance cover had been arranged. The project will be featured in the next issue of Village Viewpoint with other projects in the County.

Churchyard

It was noted that the possible closure of the Churchyard is in abeyance.

Police Matters

PC Hooper attended and confirmed that in November and December Ecton had the lowest crime figures in all 14 villages in his area.

An approach has been made to the County Council for skips outside the tip to prevent the tipping in Lower Ecton Lane.

PC Hooper reported on the problems caused by drivers dropping their children outside the World's End and leaving them to cross the road to the bus stop. Councillors were asked to pass information on this dangerous practise to the police.

Planning

Applications

It was reported that Planning Consent had been granted for the development of the Estate Office at Ecton Hall and for the realignment of the farmyard entrance at the Manor House. Approval had also been received for a finger post for the village club.

Sywell Aerodrome

In response to the planning application for a hard runway submitted before Christmas the Consortium met and it was agreed that all households in the village should be asked to send a letter of objection to Wellingborough Council. It was noted that the application is contrary to the County Plan.

Highway Matters

Because of the continual use of Lower Ecton Lane by heavy vehicles it was agreed that the County Council should be asked to review the road signs on the A45 and apply a weight restriction in the village.

In response to a request from the County Council it was agreed that the following schemes should be proposed: Cutting back the grass from the footpaths to Earls Barton and Sywell; dropped kerbs across the bottom of Church View; improved safety at the entrance to the village from the A4500 and speed restrictions through the village; parking problems at the school at delivery and collection times.

Whitbreads to be reminded to repair the boundary walls around the World's End.

Financial Matters

It was noted that the Audit for 1996/7 had been completed.

Accounts approved for payment:

East Midlands Electricity £118.85

Powergen £126.43

Mrs P Hall (salary and expenses) £121.89

In addition £7500 had been paid to J & M Construction towards the new wall.

Correspondence

It was agreed that the Pre-school Playgroup should be given permission to plant a tree in the Playing Field, preferably a flowering variety in the bottom corner opposite the telephone box.

It was decided that Operation Springclean should take place on 1 April.

New Christian Aid telephone service launched

Christian Aid is very pleased to announce the launch of a new telephone scheme for supporters which guarantees savings on your phone bill while providing financial support to Christian Aid.

Although we've resisted the tide of charity-branded products that have come out recently, we feel, exceptionally, that this a service worth offering. Not only will supporters get cheaper telephone calls, but PEC Communications gives eight percent of the cost of each call you make to Christian Aid.

The scheme is simple:

- The phone service is free to join and requires no minimum term commitment or usage. Supporters simply ring PEC Communications and register with them. There is no cost to join, and if you do not use the service you will not have to pay a penny.
- Once you have registered you are issued with a four-digit access code which you dial before each number (special adaptors for your phone are available if you don't want to dial the code each time). Each call made with the four-digit code is then routed through the cheap tariffs.
- At the end of each month you will receive a fully itemised bill, and two weeks later the amount will be debited from your account.
- All supporters' names are protected by Christian Aid.

One of the great things about the service is you do not have to change your existing phone or line provider. If you are currently with BT, you stay with them for everything to do with line rental, maintenance and services such as 1471 or call minder. These services will still be billed to you by your existing provider (eg BT), however all your calls via PEC Communications will be charged at much lower rates, providing savings across the board.

We are confident that this service is great value for supporters. We know to be excellent. With eight percent of the cost of every call going to Christian Aid, supporters can help Christian Aid whilst saving money on their phone calls.

MANDY, A 10 YEAR OLD RUNAWAY WOULD LIKE YOUR HELP

Mandy ran away from home because of the physical abuse she suffered at the hands of her stepfather. Lonely and scared she was found begging on the streets by The Children's Society's street workers who gave her food and a bed for the night. She is now back with Mum and her stepfather is no longer able to abuse her.

Each year there are an estimated 100,000 instances of children and young people running away from home or care. And street work and refuges for young runaways is only part of the work undertaken by The Children's Society, a voluntary society of the Church of England and the Church in Wales, in its 90 or so projects around England and Wales.

Perhaps, if you like counting money, you could help children like Mandy?

As many readers of the magazine may already know, Mike Baylis of West Street has recently relinquished the role as The Children's Society's Honorary Local Secretary (HLS) in Ecton. This means that there is currently no representative in the parish to undertake the annual emptying of the 30 or so Society house boxes kindly held by various residents.
