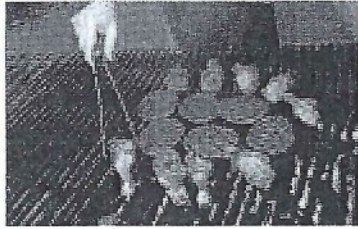

Thory Bonsey, Rector of Ecton and Warden of Ecton House, 1967 – 1973
A note by Frances Bonsey

Thory died in Australia in May 2008. I note that there is no mention of his time at Ecton on the website, and thought you might like a few comments.

Thory was invited to become rector of Ecton, and warden of Ecton House, early in 1967, and we moved there in September that year. I quote from my diary: "There were seventeen workmen in the house or grounds when we arrived, and in greater or lesser numbers, they were with us until several months after the official opening by H. R. H. the Duchess of Gloucester on May 8th 1968. The ground floor of the Rectory, together with 24 bedrooms in the new wing, constituted the House. We had a semi-flat on the first floor and in the attics. There was also a housekeeper's flat on the first floor."

I was interested to read the account of the last warden, Canon Evans, who found it very difficult facing opposition from parishioners who did not want the House to close and be sold. Thory and I faced similar opposition from parishioners who were against its opening! This was especially so when the upstairs Parish Meeting Room became the new chapel for the House. The fact that a new Meeting Room was being made from converted stables on the ground floor was not considered a fair return!

This venture by the Peterborough Diocese was a great success and became a flourishing concern. I quote from my diary again: "Many people come here, some for a day, some to stay two or three nights. The groups are varied, some specifically religious, and others secular conferences. Each group brings its own interest and feel, no two are alike. We are greeting many people and enjoying the contacts."

The success of the House was largely due to Thory's passionate enthusiasm backed up by a wonderful staff, very largely drawn from Ecton village. In March 1973 Thory became a Canon of Peterborough cathedral in recognition of his work at Ecton.

On a personal note, our three children were married during our time at Ecton. Peter and Val in March 1968 and Cathy and Bob in September 1973, and both in Ecton church by Thory. Martin and Joan were married in Australia in February 1971, and Thory was able to be with them for the wedding. Our first grandchild Adrian Bartlet Bonsey was baptized by Thory in Ecton church on Whit Sunday 1975. Peter and Val were living at 40 High Street at the time. Alistair St. John Bonsey was baptized by Cyprian Thorpe at Easter 1974.

If you follow current affairs you will be aware that the Church of England has been in the news again recently. There was a high-profile debate nationally on the controversial matter of whether women should be able to become bishops, quickly followed by the 'Lambeth Conference'. This is a gathering of all the bishops, not just in the C. of E., but from the Anglican Church throughout the world, and it takes place every ten years. This year again, discord and argument have dogged it, and you could be forgiven if you gained the impression that the Church is pulling itself apart. Here is not the place to delve into the issues involved, but I hope that what you read in the rest of this article will convince you that this certainly is not the case in Ecton, Great Doddington, and Wilby. Here we are very optimistic about the future. We have many very exciting plans for new initiatives and, in the case of Doddington and Wilby, imaginative improvements to the facilities in our buildings to make them much more accessible to the communities they serve, for a much wider range of events.

Since I last wrote a huge amount seems to have happened. Much preparation has been going on in the background for this year's holiday club and the children have been booking their places. We are delighted that some children from Ecton have booked in this year. This year's club is called 'Waste Watchers' and concentrates the children's attention upon 'green' issues. As last year, there will be four morning sessions, with optional extra activities in the afternoons for the children in key stage two. The fifth day (Wednesday this year) will be a full day out and this year we shall be taking the children to Twycross Zoo. There is much excitement in the air.

Our biggest special event since our last issue was the open-air 'Songs of Praise' on the Wilby Way Estate on Sunday June 29th. Although this is some way from Ecton we were delighted to welcome some Ecton folk who came along. We have longed for many years to do something in that area, but have been hampered by the estate's lack of facilities. We held a very successful open-air carol party there last Christmas and have now followed it with a similar summer event. There was a free barbecue, a singing group from Wilby School, the Doddington and Wilby church choirs took part, and there was some drama too. It was a lovely evening, much enjoyed by the large crowd that joined us – we lost count at 120!

One other exciting thing going on in our churches over the summer period is that we have with us an ordination student, placed here for eight weeks as part of her theological training. Mrs. Christine Ostler lives in Wellingborough and is a member of All Saints Church in Midland Road. Many will already know her. She is initially shadowing me and experiencing what life is like for clergy serving in a group of three rural villages (it's very different from town ministry), then gradually she will be sharing in many of the activities of our three churches. At the time of writing the placement has been going for just a few days, but already it has become delightful and I can see that it will be a great blessing to us 'on the ground' as well as (I hope) useful to her.

Ecton Church has a particularly special event taking place during August. On Sunday 17th Bishop Frank will be with us for our service at 11.00am. He is coming particularly to licence Wendy Villette as a pastoral assistant in the parish. Wendy has for some years held a licence for her work as part of the chaplaincy team at Princess Marina Hospital, but that licence is now to be extended to enable her to serve officially within the parish as well. We have also been making plans for a new work with children in Ecton village. At the end of the summer term all the children from the village were offered a free DVD as a gift from the Church with the first two episodes of an animation about a Jewish Christian family living within Rome in the First Century AD, and trying to keep alive the stories of Jesus. This material is called 'Story Keepers', and in the Autumn we shall be beginning a series of after-school club events called 'Story Keepers Parties' which should be great fun as well as introducing the children to the Christian faith and the Christian community locally. We shall show all the other episodes there. There are more DVDs available for any children who live in the village, but who don't attend the village school. Please ring me on 01933 226711 if you would like one.

August can be a rather quiet month in many churches. Congregation sizes are often low as people go away on holiday and many regular activities stop for the holiday period. However, as you see, we shall be keeping very busy, it is very much 'business as usual' for us. If you are around over the summer do come to one (or more!) of our services. There is always a very warm welcome at all three of our churches.

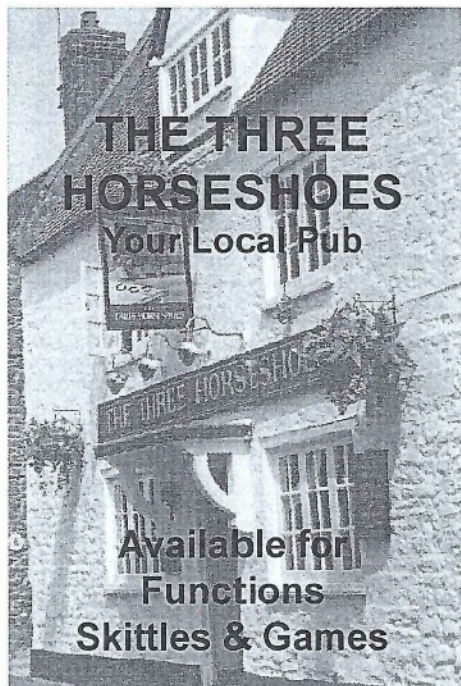

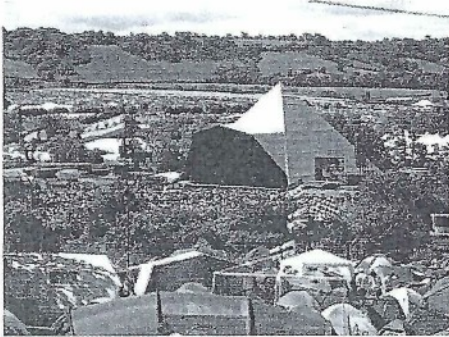

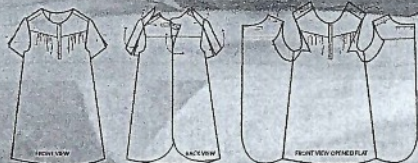

Summer Cocktails

Mix all ingredients in a cocktail shaker with ice. Strain into a tall glass over ice. Garnish with cherry.



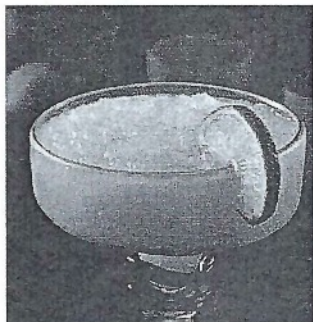
Alaska

SATELLITE NAVIGATION EQUIPMENT



Don't lose your satellite navigation equipment to car thieves.

With satellite navigation equipment becoming more popular with motorists, it's also becoming more popular with criminals.

Where it's portable keep it safe by taking it, together with the support cradle and suction pads, with you when you leave the car. And remember to wipe away any suction pad marks left on the windscreen or dashboard as thieves will look out for these.

Don't leave the equipment in the glove compartment – thieves will usually check there first.

You can also help by following these tips:

- When choosing a satellite navigation system look for one with anti-theft security features.
- Mark your satellite navigation equipment system with your postcode and house number or your vehicle registration number or another unique number, using special security markers.
- Make a note of the make, model and serial number of the equipment and keep the note somewhere safe – not in the car. Consider recording this information on one of the commercially available asset registers.
- Don't leave anything on view in your car. Thieves are opportunists and it only takes them moments to break into your car.
- Lock all doors and windows, not forgetting the sunroof, when leaving your car.
- Never leave the keys in the ignition when the car is unattended, even while you're paying for petrol.
- Use car parks that are part of the police-approved Safer Parking Scheme. Approved car parks display the official 'Park Mark' sign.

Please be aware Car key burglars are active!



There have been various incidents across the North of the County over the past few days where thieves are targeting car keys.

Many modern cars are now very difficult to steal without the keys. This means that criminals may break in to properties in search of car keys in order to steal the vehicle.

Some criminals may look through the house window, particularly the kitchen area to see if they can see the car keys. They may put things like fishing rods or clothes props with a coat hanger on the end through the letterbox to hook the keys and steal the vehicle.

Follow these simple tips to reduce the risk of you having your vehicle stolen from outside your property.

Don't leave your car keys lying on a hall table, near the front door or anywhere where a criminal could "Go Fishing"

Don't put your car keys in an obvious place but remember, if you do have your car keys attached to your house keys they do need to be within easy reach in case you need to escape from the property in an emergency.

If you have a high value vehicle and you have to park in the driveway, you may want to consider fitting substantial gates or security posts.

You should take other basic security measures to ensure you aren't the victim of a sneak in thief. Make sure doors and windows are closed and locked.

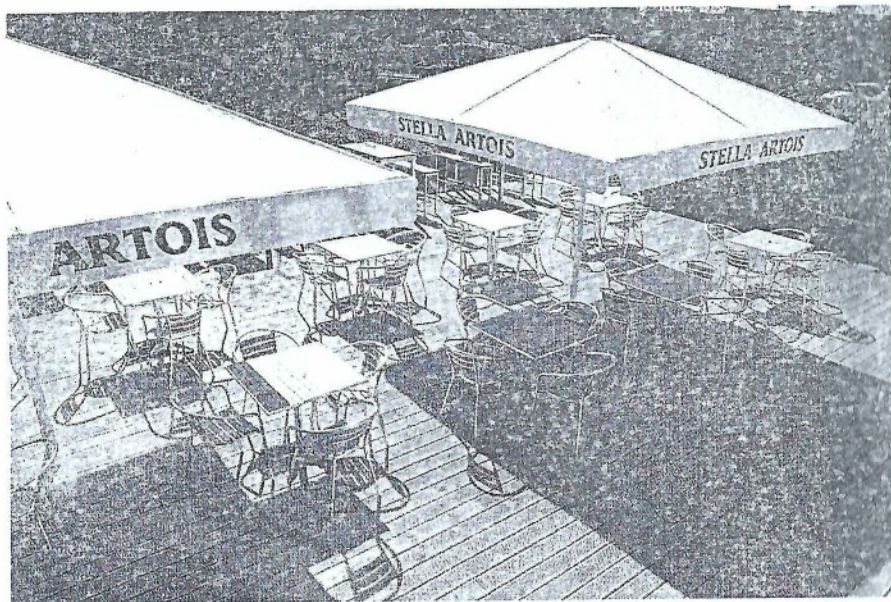
If you have a garage, please park your car in it. Many people with garages use them for storage. Clear them out and use them for the purpose for which they were built.

Remember a thief will look for any opportunity to steal your vehicle and will look for keys left hanging around. "Don't leave yours hanging around"
