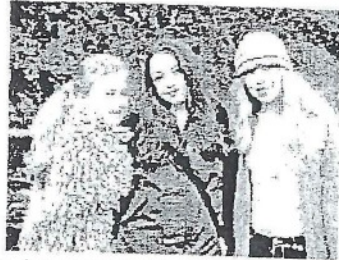

Washing lines and garden shrubs have been vandalised twice recently, so a call to the village to look out for whoever is doing this. When you are posting that letter see who's about

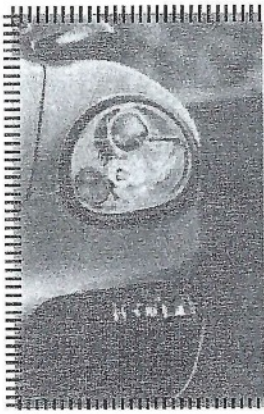
ECTON FELLOWSHIP

From The Vicarage,



As I write this month I have just completed compiling the Christmas leaflet that we deliver through every door at this time of year. You should be receiving your copy very soon. In that I have written of how this season is all about 'Goodwill to All People' because we are celebrating the birth of the One who was (and is) the 'Prince of Peace'. Therefore Christmas is really not about cards and presents and pudding and turkey, and perhaps too much to drink(!) but it's about reconciliation and the putting aside of differences, not just for a day or two during the holiday celebrations, but as a new beginning that will last. It is also about the reconciliation of humankind with our maker, God Himself, as well as reconciliation between one person and another. I will not repeat all that I have written in the leaflet, but let's try to keep that focus this Christmas and find ways of improving those relationships that we find difficult or strained.

Over the last month we have been concerned and perplexed by the reports coming in from Pakistan concerning the suspension of democracy and the imposition of a military dictatorship. I have felt a mixture of emotions, and perhaps you have too. On the one hand I have been appalled and distressed by the scenes of openly heavy-handed police brutality as the demonstrators have been 'dealt with', but at the same time I have been heartened that so many thousands in that country see democracy as so important that they're prepared to persevere in their demonstrations regardless of the likely personal cost. I worry, of course, as you must too, that Pakistan could erupt into full-scale civil war at any time, which could result in an absolute blood-bath, and I pray that God would save her from that. I pray also for the Christian minority there who seek to bring Christ, the Prince of Peace, into that dreadful situation.

This is a double issue of our magazine this month and so I am saying, 'Happy New Year' as well as 'Merry Christmas', which always seems odd when writing in mid-November, but the greeting is sincere nonetheless. In our churches we are for the first time approaching this wonderful season as a group of three villages (plus the Wilby Way Estate) and so our programme this year is slightly different from the past. One or two things have disappeared and other new things have appeared. Do please read carefully the leaflet that will be arriving soon and please come and join us for at least one of the events we shall be holding.

MUSIC: TO YOUR.....CHRISTMAS TREE. Adrian Pulford

In Rainbows – Radiohead

Radiohead have always broken the mould and with 'In Rainbows' they've done it again. It was released for download only on October 10th with an unprecedented caveat – you can pay what you want for it or download it for free! Rumour has it that the average price people have elected to pay is \$8 (£4) - so that has to be more than the band would have received from EMI had it been released in the traditional way! It will be released on CD and vinyl by XL records in January, or for £40 you can pre-order a limited edition box set including download (now) and CD + vinyl + book etc in time for Christmas. Go to www.inrainbows.com

The music? Well I've got everything Radiohead or Thom Yorke have ever put out so I'm the wrong person to ask – but 'In Rainbows' is probably their most accessible album since 'Kid A' – anyway, have a listen online and decide for yourself. 'Jigsaw Falling Into Place' is the first single and will be released in January.

Runout Groove – Stephen Duffy & The Lilac Time

Stephen Duffy is the best songwriter you've never heard of. He co-wrote many of Robbie Williams' hits (Radio, Tripping, Advertising Space) but that's just the tip of his talents. 'Runout Groove' is crammed full of well-crafted pop songs delivered as only the songwriter and his band can deliver them. You'll think of Robbie when you hear the opening lines of 'Another Time', the album's opener (that's because SD has had such an influence on his solo style) but you'll soon start to enjoy this album, Duffy's first for five years, for its own sake.

Standout tracks are 'Driving Somewhere' and 'Dark Squadrons', but the whole album is great. If there's any justice this, after 20 years of trying, will be Duffy's mainstream breakthrough, but probably not.

Raising Sand – Robert Plant & Alison Krauss

Just as Led Zeppelin are about to reunite Robert Plant decides to release his best ever 'solo' work with this collaboration with Alison Krauss. 'Raising Sand' is wonderful, and their voices work so well together, whether on slow-tempo country tinged beauties like 'Killing The Blues' or on the first single, the upbeat Everley's cover, 'Gone, Gone, Gone'. Produced by T Bone Burnett who RP credits on the sleeve for 'teaching an old dog new tricks', and its true, Plant's voice is used in such a restrained and unusual way to complement Alison's 'voice of an angel'. Communication Breakdown, it ain't!

This is a rare treat of an album, and a real surprise that truly is better than the sum of its parts. Ask Santa to bring you this one!

Revival – John Fogarty

Did you secretly (or perhaps openly?) like Creedence Clearwater Revival? Well, the moment you put this on and start listening to opening track 'Don't You Wish It Was True' you'll be a'rockin' just like Proud Mary! This is a good-time record that isn't trying to rewrite the rulebook, just John Fogarty, the voice of Creedence, making excellent swamp-country music. Fogarty's great vocal style kicks in with 'Gunslinger' the second track and you know you're onto a winner. Try listening to this album without quietly smiling at its easy class. Music like this doesn't date in my opinion and whilst a must for Creedence fans, it ought to gain wider appeal, so buy it!



Long Road Out Of Eden – The Eagles

How can you not want this for Christmas? – The Eagles first new album for 28 years! The best selling album of all time is 'The Eagles Greatest Hits' pushing 'Thriller' and 'The Wall' into 2nd and 3rd place – so I guess the fans are out there. They won't be disappointed with LROOE either, as this 2-disc set covers every aspect of why we all love their music. The ten-minute title track, whilst no Hotel California, is still up there with their best stuff. Other standout tracks are 'Busy Being Fabulous' and 'Waiting In The Weeds', but the whole album is excellent and well worth the 28-year wait. Don Henley's vocals, Joe Walsh's superb guitar and Glen Frey's songwriting skills are combined here to make an album that delivers in way that so few albums by today's bands can. Those wonderful harmonies abound and you know that you're listening to a band with a real legacy and a back catalogue to die for. This actually lives up to the hype for once and if you haven't already got it – ask someone you love to buy it for you.

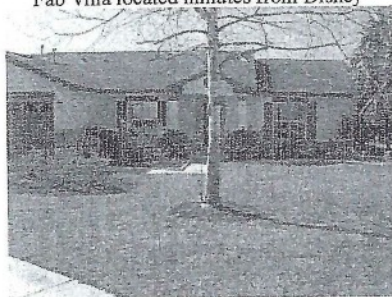

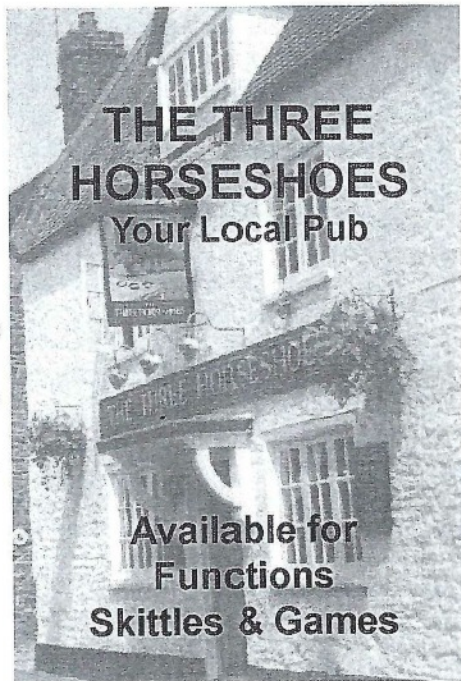

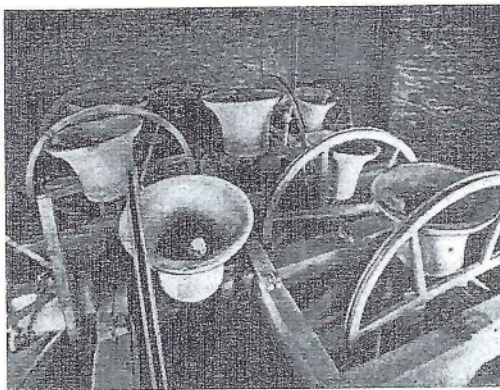

Yes, this is a self-portrait of the Ecton Witches and occurs when the women of the village meet up for their regular Witches evenings!

The Witches have enjoyed five extremely sociable gatherings over the course of 2007; having imbibed a considerable amount of potion and cooked up some extremely delicious cauldrons!

CLEAN campaign goes to Northampton Borough Council

CLEAN were invited on Thursday 22nd November to speak to the Overview and Scrutiny committee about their fight for tough odour controls at Anglian Water's Sewage Works at Great Billing. CLEAN presented clear evidence that Anglian Water is in breach of Government guidelines, and criticised the Environmental Health Department of Northampton Borough Council for their inaction.

The councillors were told that their Environmental Health officers have it in their power to issue a legal notice forcing Anglian Water to act. The Northampton Chronicle and Echo reported in their Saturday edition how CLEAN had criticised the council for not issuing a legal notice forcing Anglian Water to act, adding that school children are prevented from using their playing fields. It further reported that CLEAN had asked "Why does Northampton have an environmental health department that doesn't want to help the people affected by this terrible smell? Is this department fit for purpose?". Steve Elsey for Northampton Environmental Health had said that it was up to his department, and that they "might issue an abatement notice tomorrow, or they might not".

The Chairman of the committee, Christopher Malpas has formed a working party of councillors to look into this issue. He said the matter would be discussed in the next meeting on 31st January, when Anglian Water would be invited.

Some ideas for your Christmas Veg



Sprouts

one of two pieces of crispy bacon, chopped

one apple, diced

little butter

Cook as usual, drain, add chopped crispy bacon and a diced apple that has been sautéed in a little butter.

Carrots

one or two large carrots, cut into chunks

little butter

one orange, rind and juice of

a pinch of chives, chopped

Cut the carrots into large chunks, cook as usual, drain and return to the pan with a little butter, rind and juice of 1 orange and 2 tblsp. chopped chives heat gently and serve.

Roast Potatoes

a few pounds of potatoes

fresh breadcrumbs

100g. or 150g. Parmesan cheese, grated

Roast as usual 10 minutes before the end of cooking sprinkle with fresh breadcrumbs and grated Parmesan cheese, return to the oven to finish roasting. This is very effective on roast potatoes that have been sliced almost through like a fan before roasting.

Mashed Potatoes

some Pesto and garlic

one celeriac (optional), mashed

a few cooked parsnips (optional)

1/2 tblsp. wholegrain mustard

Add pesto and chopped garlic. OR Add mashed celeriac. OR Add cooked parsnips and wholegrain mustard before mashing.

Stuffing

Add clemantines, chopped, peeled

Add pesto and chopped garlic. OR Add mashed celeriac. OR Add cooked parsnips and wholegrain mustard before mashing.

Rosemary Roast Potatoes with Garlic

10 medium potatoes

4 x 5ml spoons dried rosemary, crushed

1 wine glass of olive oil (extra virgin)

4 Garlic cloves, crushed

Scrub potatoes in their skins and cut into four.

Steam for ten minutes, then toss in olive oil, rosemary and crushed garlic. Place the potatoes on a warmed baking tray and roast in hot oven for 30 minutes at 190°C/375°F/Gas Mark 5.

Serve immediately, the outside should be crunchy.

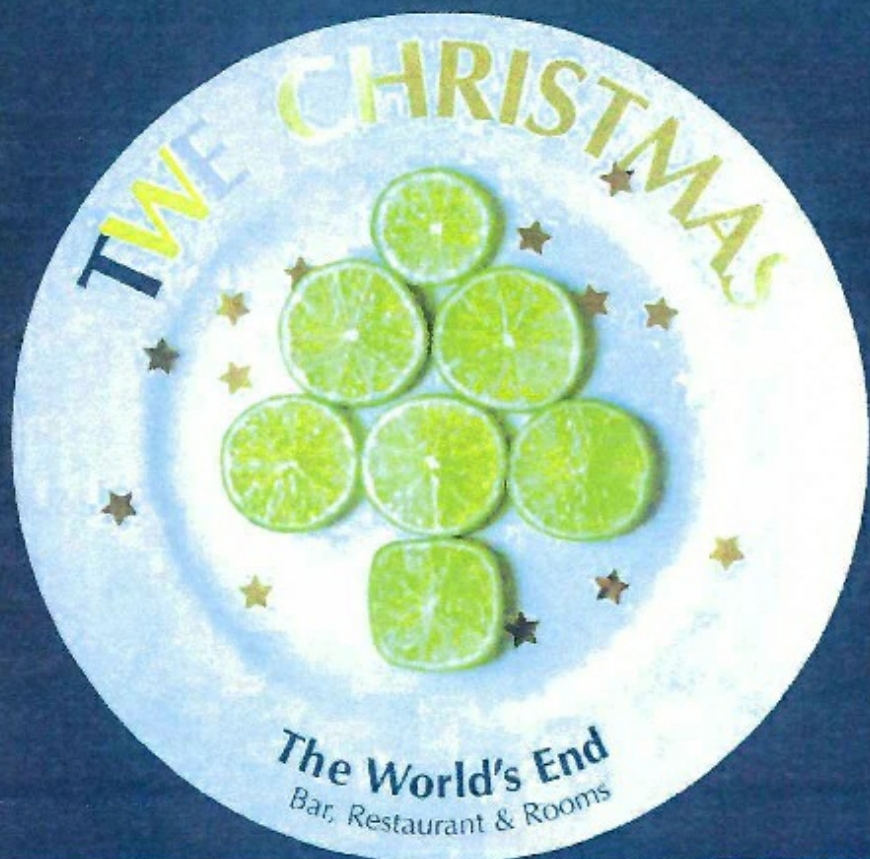
