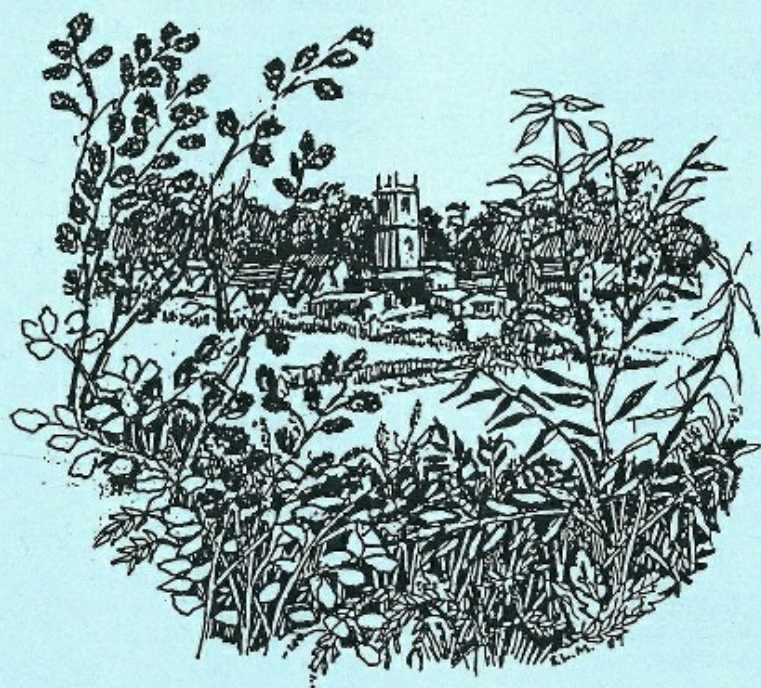

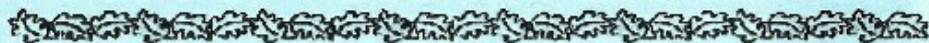

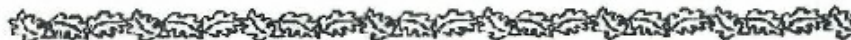

The Road to Emmaus

In Luke's Gospel Chapter 24, Jesus walks alongside two disciples on the road to Emmaus. They are talking about the events of Good Friday and the first Easter Day, and are not sure what to make of it all. Jesus, whom they don't recognise, asks them questions and teaches them reassuringly, using the Bible. They press him to stay the night and as he gives thanks for the bread at their meal, they recognise him before he vanishes from their sight.

Coming to faith in Christ is a journey that can take a lifetime. It is often said that 'faith is caught, not taught', and journeying with others gives us support and encouragement along the way. During Lent this year, we are planning to run an Emmaus course in the Church on the following evenings from 7.30-9.0pm:- Tuesdays 11th, 18th, 25th March; Wednesday 2nd April; Tuesdays 8th, 15th April.

Emmaus – The Way of Faith, is a flexible programme of sessions that is suitable for everyone. It doesn't matter whether you have been a Christian for a few weeks or your whole life. If you are unsure and just want to find out more about what Christians believe, or if you went to Sunday School as a child but have lost touch with your religion; this may also be the course for you. Everyone is welcome!

W.I. REPORT

Twelve members bravely turned out on a bitterly cold January evening for our first meeting of the year.

The main item of business was to discuss and prioritise our preferences from eight Resolutions, ranging from 'children's diets, exercise and health' to 'care of the elderly', put forward by members nationally; in turn, these Resolutions will be debated fully at the 2003 national AGM of the WI later in the year, with that voted to be of most concern to the nation's WI members then forwarded to the Government for action.

Over a welcome cup of tea, we then enjoyed the various arts and crafts brought along by members, ranging from quilling to quilting, from lace making to painting – not a pot of jam in sight! A small group we may be, but Ecton WI has a wealth of talent among its membership. Why not bring along your talents to our happy band – new members are assured of a warm welcome.

Our meeting on Tuesday, 4 March is a talk on 'Village Ghosts' by Mrs S Philpott.

ECTON PARISH COUNCIL

MINUTES of a meeting of Ecton Parish Council held at Ecton Village Club on Monday 18 November 2002.

Present: Mr D C Dicks (Chairman)
Mrs K Humphreys, Mrs S Ingram, Mrs S Sanders, Dr A Bantock, Messrs M Creed and T Green
and Cllr K. Payne

67/02 Apologies for absence were received from Mr T Moffett and Mr W Wilson.

68/02 Mr Green asked whether he should declare an interest in Item 75/02 but it was not thought necessary as advice was only being sought at this stage.

69/02 The Minutes of the meeting held on 16 September 2002 were approved and signed.

70/02 Matters arising from the Minutes

(a) Lower Ecton Lane: The Chairman had received a copy letter from the County Council to Mr Crabtree. NCC commented that "there appear to be relatively few reports of fly-tipped waste along the lane in relation to the importance that is placed on this issue". This view was contested by the Parish Council and NCC would be informed again of the concerns over this problem. The fact remains that the rubbish is there whether or not it is reported, and that the problem has been going on for many years and is not getting any better.

Dr Bantock had had a conversation with Inspector Colman who would be attending a meeting about fly tipping and it was also known that a number of court cases were pending. Various clear-ups have taken place but these need to be done on a regular basis. The gateways are not cleared to regularly as there is the question as to whether the land owners are responsible for these.

Dr Bantock also commented that the Neighbourhood Watch schemes in the village would support the closure of Lower Ecton Lane but the Chairman pointed out that only one objector would stop this taking place.

(b) Bus Shelter: The narrower replacement shelter had been installed but it was noted that the path beneath the shelter was in an awful condition. Queensbury had said they would patch up the pavement. It was agreed to ask NCC to inspect the shelter and make sure that it is in the correct position.

(c) Sywell Airfield: The Consortium's attempt to seek a judicial review is still in hand. An indication of the likely costs will be needed before a decision is made whether to proceed - if this is Counsel's opinion.

(d) Police matters: Following a recent meeting of Community Safety Officers it had been agreed that information would go to the CSOs and it was suggested that relevant information would be posted on the village noticeboards. Cllr Payne reported on the August and September crime figures which included a criminal damage incident to a vehicle in Sywell Lane.

(e) Playing Field: It was agreed to obtain an estimate for sealing the safety tiles.

(f) Footpaths: It was noted that the whole of the footpath on the A4500 had now been cut back. The siding of the footpath in Sywell Lane was still outstanding and would be reported again to NCC, together with thanks for completing the A4500 path.

(g) Youth Club: A card had been received from the Youth Club thanking the Parish Council for its promised financial donation.

71/02 Financial Matters:

(a) Accounts for payment: £124.61 - ABB Ltd (Paid out of meeting); £7.00 - NALC; £223.25 - WBC - Grass Cutting; £133.85 - Clerk's Salary/Expenses; £380.70 - District Audit; £60.00 - Ecton Village Club; £27.69 - Clerk's back pay (see Minute 71/02(c)).

(b) The accounts for the half year ended 30 September 2002 were approved and signed by the Chairman and Clerk.

(c) Clerk's Salary

When the Clerk's Terms & Conditions and Salary were agreed at the July 2002 meeting the salary had been calculated pro rata on the full time salary scales as the part times scales had not been sent by NALC. It was not until the revised salary scales were received in October that the error was noticed.

The July meeting agreed to the payment of £6.69 per hour for 2.5 hours work per week, which equaled £870 p.a. (£144.95 per meeting).

At that time the Clerk was paid a rate of £7.70 per hour, which took into account the relevant spinal point entitlement for length of service. The time allocated for Council work was 1.5 hours per week. This equalled £600.60 per annum (£100.10 per meeting)

From 1.4.02 the national salary scale is £8.212 per hour on the top spinal point.

1.5 hours = £640.54	(£106.76 per meeting)
2.0 hours = £854.05	(£142.34 per meeting)
2.5 hours = £1067.60	(£177.93 per meeting)

From 1.10.02 to 31.3.03 the national salary scale will be £8.293 per hour

It was agreed that the Clerk's salary would be based on 1.5 hours per week and that she would try to record the amount of time spent on Council work

72/02 Standing Orders: It was agreed to adopt the model form of Standing Orders as draft by NALC.

73/02 As 2003 is an election year it will be necessary to hold the Annual Parish Meeting on or before 14 May. It was therefore agreed to bring forward the date to 14 May.

74/02 Planning Applications:

The following planning applications has been received, upon which there had been a "no comments" response:

WP/2002/0587/F - Mr B T Beck - single storey rear conservatory extension following demolition of porch at 76 High Street;

WP/2002/0658/LB - Mr B T Beck - sky satellite dish to wall of 76 High Street;

WP/2002/0627/F - Mr & Mrs F Cook - Conservatory at 49 High Street;

WP/2002/0670/F - New stone boundary wall - 3 Church Way.

A revised Sand & Gravel excavation application had been received on which comments were required by 12 December. Mr Wilson and Mr Green would look at this application and send in any comments.

It was noted that Mr. Stevenson (WBC) is watching developments at Ecton Hall.

Planning Permission had been granted in respect of: WP/2002/0479/F - Conservatory at 1 Parsons Close and WP/2002/0495/F - Rear and side extensions at 30 West Street.

75/02 Village Club:

Mr Green reported that it would probably not be necessary to re-apply for planning permission. He raised the question as to whether the building works could be done through Parish Council, thus saving the VAT element and he was in touch with Pam Wilton at NALC about this. It was agreed to seek the advice of NALC.

It was noted that about £31,000 was available to date and that the work on the roof had gone out to tender. It was agreed that, if necessary, Council meetings would be held in the Old Chapel while the Hall was out of use.

76/02 Street Lighting: The Clerk reported that the Schedule for unmetered supplies had been received. It was noted that Light No.30 in Church Way was not working. It was agreed to obtain costs for the replacement of the ornamental lights and the cost of insuring these.

77/02 Freedom of Information Act.

It was agreed to adopt the core document and any optional clauses which may apply.

78/02 NCC Structure Plan

Members would read this document and send in any observations direct.

79/02 Meeting of Joint Parishes

The Chairman reported on this meeting and the Parish Plan proposals. It was noted that the Countryside Agency had money available for some schemes.
